The problem of making Oregon a great dairy state, which is now much before the public, will engage the attention of the Oregon Dairymen's association at its thirty-sixth annual convention at Medford, January 9 and 10. Brandt, secretary, and head of the department of dairy husbandry at Oregon State college.

In the city administration U. S. Halentine, prominent attorney, will succeed Lem L. Gaghagen, present police judge. Lena Dennis will be sworn in to fill the office of city treasurer, now held by Mrs. Irma Dixon, who was not a candidate for re-election.

Two new faces will be seen on the city council. W. D. Butler, ward 3, and Clifton Richmond, ward 4, will succeed Harry E. Peltz and Elmer Balsiger, who were not before the voters at the last election.

Officers Do Not Suspect Foul Play In Death of Ball

Although Dr. E. O. Patterson performed an autopsy over the body of John Lee Ball, Klamath Indian who resided at Chiloquin, and who died Sunday of what doctors termed systemic poisoning, officers stated that foul play was not suspected.

The organs of Ball were sent to the state pathologist for examination to see if poison had been administered and a coroner's jury heard the facts of death from doctors Monday night. It was revealed by County Coroner Earl Whitlock.

Deputy Sheriff Louis Mueller stated last night that it is thought by officers that Ball died from drinking too much whiskey while in Medford recently. Mueller stated that reservation officers do not suspect foul play. Deputy Coroner Henry Joyaux reiterated the officer's statement.

The report of the pathologist, it is thought, will tell whether or not Ball died of poison foreign to intoxicants. Some doubt is felt, in spite of the opinion of officers, that foul play did not enter into the death.

Ball, it is known, was a relative of the husband of Mrs. Elva Ball and of the wife of "Buck" Pierson, murdered Klamath Indian. Bill Thomason, Indian officer, arrested and held in connection with Pierson's death, was an employee of Mrs. Elva Ball.

The fact that John Lee Ball was an Indian officer, and that he was related to some of the persons connected indirectly with Pierson's death, lends credence to the idea that he may have been poisoned.

Washington U. Approves Use of Entrance Exams

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 1. (UP)—In an effort to control the growth of the University of Washington and raise scholastic standards, the board of regents today approved addition of entrance examinations compiled by the national college entrance examination board.

Heretofore certificates of graduation from state high schools have been sufficient to obtain admission to the state institution.

Dr. M. Lyle Spencer, president, endorsed the proposal after a meeting with the regents.

The University of Washington is the first state institution in the nation to adopt the examination board system, which has previously been employed only by privately owned institutions such as Princeton, Yale, and Harvard.
