

Riegels Feels Blue About Bad Error in Game With Georgia

Lineup Given for Basketball Game

Klamath Students To Attend Meet At University

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 2. (UP)—More than 24 hours after the episode, Southern California tonight still echoed with discussion of the wrong-direction run by Roy Riegels which gave Georgia Tech a victory over California in the Tournament of Roses football game.

Thousands and thousands of times it was related how the California center, playing a whale of a defensive game against Tech, cost his team a victory in the annual New Year's Tournament of Roses football game.

Started Right, Turned
Riegels picked up a Tech fumble and dashed 65 yards toward his own goal line. The play led to a safety for Tech, and the points derived from the safety measured the Golden Tornado's 8 to 7 win over the Golden Bears.

The play in question started on the Tech 23-yard line, where Thomason bobbled the ball when he was tackled after a 10-yard advance.

Riegels came out of a pile of men with the ball, collided with two Tech players, took four steps toward the Tech goal-line and then, after pivoting to avoid a tackler, turned and ran toward his own posts.

Lom's Shouts Drowned
Straight down the side of the field he went with Lom, a teammate, striding after him but 15 yards behind. Lom gradually closed the gap as Riegels neared the goal-line. Lom's warning shouts were drowned in the roar from the 70,000 who packed the rose bowl.

Just as Riegels passed over the line, Lom grabbed him by the sweater and turned him around. Attempting to amend for the situation, Riegels and Lom started back field, but Pund, the big Tech center, spoiled that and spilled Riegels with the ball on California's one-foot line.

Lom's Kick Blocked
On the next play Lom's kick was blocked. A California man recovered it but behind the goal line and the play went for a safety and two points for Tech.

Riegels, whose home is in Oakland, was heart-broken tonight. He knew his error cost his team victory and attempts of teammates and his coach to console him were futile.

Riegels Names Self
His general attitude was summed up when Barney Oldfield failed to get his name during an introduction.

"Never mind the name," Riegels said. "I'm just the guy who ran the wrong way in the New Year's game."

"I didn't realize that I was wrong until Lom tugged at my jersey," he said. "I wasn't hurt or dazed and there is no alibi I can offer. I haven't any idea how I got directions confused."

"I felt terrible when I discovered the mistake and I feel worse now. I guess I'll never live it down. I hate to think it spoiled our chance to win."

Lom Aids Teammate
Lom, criticized in some quarters for his failure to tackle Riegels before the latter could get so far in the wrong direction, explained today that he feared he would miss his team-mate and spoil any chance to remedy the situation.

"Riegels shouldn't receive so much blame," Lom said. "It was one of those things that could happen to anyone. I might have tackled him as far back as the 20-yard line but I might have missed him and then it would have been the end. Pund was following too close to let us get back any of the distance lost."

Returns Fighting
Lom said Riegels was too amazed and chagrined to say anything when he discovered his mistake. He threw his headgear to the ground and walked around pulling his hair over his eyes.

After the safety was scored, Coach Nils Price pulled Riegels out of the game. The player walked slowly to the bench and then to the dressing room.

The fact that Riegels returned to the game in the second half to tear the great holds in the Tech line, to block punts and to make spectacular tackles, soon will be forgotten.

Coaches Overlook Error
The fact that he was the man who "ran the wrong way in a Tournament of Roses game" probably will go down in football history.

Nils Price, coach of California, Bill Alexander of Tech and a dozen other mentors, prominent football authorities, were prone to regard Riegels' error as "just one of those things that are too bad and might happen to anyone."

Sport Writers Critical
Critical sport writers point out, however, that the difference between the 30 yards to Tech's goal and the 79 to his own should have warned him that he was headed the wrong way.

Riegels is 26 years old, made a varsity letter last year, has been elected to captain next year's squad and has been known as one of the best linemen on the coast.

The first league basketball games of the season will be held Friday and Saturday nights, January 4 and 5, when the local quintet will meet the Grants Pass team here both nights. The game will be held in the new high school gymnasium, the first Southern Oregon conference game to be held on that floor.

The captain for the two games will be Harold Kendall. A new captain is being chosen for each game this year. Richard Robustelli will substitute as left guard for Lee Pruitt, who injured his knee in a practice game last week. Pruitt will probably be placed back on the team for the next game.

The lineup, according to Coach French, will be as follows:
Center, Harold Robertson; rt. Harold Kendall; lt. Leo Crockett; rg. Richard Robustelli; lg. Harold Olson. The referee will probably be Frank Hall.

According to Mr. French, the team is in excellent condition. A good attendance is expected at the game.

One of them put overboard with it, and managed to get within hailing distance of shore near Northeast, Pa. He was hauled ashore by residents and told his story. The other smuggler was rescued by launch.

CHICAGO, Jan. 2. (UP)—Chicago University's basketball quintet, after nearly a month's inactivity because of influenza, got into action tonight, nosing out Belmont by the narrow margin of 26 to 16.
