

LEWIS LOSES MAT CROWN

Gus Sonnenburg, Football Star, Gets Title Belt

BOSTON GARDEN, Boston, Jan. 4. (UP)—"Dynamite" Gus Sonnenburg, former Dartmouth football star, won the heavyweight mat wrestling crown tonight by defeating Ed "Strangler" Lewis before a wildly-cheering mob that jammed the garden to capacity.

Sonnenburg got the first fall in 29 minutes 46 seconds, coming out of a face lock and pinning Lewis to the mat with lightning rapidity with his famous flying tackle.

When the two wrestlers came back into the ring Sonnenburg immediately began butting Lewis about the ring. Three times Lewis was tossed outside the ropes and three times Sonnenburg hauled him back as he tried to re-enter the ring. The fourth time the referee warned Lewis to return to the ring immediately or forfeit the bout, but Lewis, apparently dazed by Sonnenburg's butting attack, stood outside the ropes while the referee counted.

Tex Rickard's Condition Serious Dempsey Arrives

Muldoon Favors Dempsey's Return To Squared Ring

NEW YORK, Jan. 4. (UP)—William Muldoon of the New York state athletic commission is the latest convert to the cause of Jack Dempsey.

The "old Roman," who trained John J. Sullivan for his greatest fight, today declared his belief that Jack Dempsey, former ruler of the title world, should be named champion to succeed Gene Tunney, retired.

Muldoon is a great admirer of Tunney, and one needs not exert his memory greatly to recall the days when the commissioner was listed among the theoretical foes of the man he now believes should be crowned champion.

In addition to coming out flat-footed in favor of the former champion, Muldoon surprised his friends by declaring that had Jack Dempsey remembered to go to the neutral corner while Gene Tunney was on the floor at Chicago, it might not have been necessary for the latter to announce his formal retirement from the duties of heavyweight champion.

Muldoon was one of those who drafted the rule which requires a fighter to retire to a neutral corner after a knockdown, but he pointed out that the rule he sponsored provided for the referee to see that the fighter who scored the knockdown takes the neutral corner, returning to take up the count with the time-keeper.

Dempsey's return to the ring appears assured in the face of his announcement while enroute to Miami Beach, Fla., that he might meet the winner of the Young Stribling-Jack Sharkey fight there next month.

He would enter the ring a favorite against either of these men, boxing experts here believe.
