

Believe British Colonel Traitor In Afghan Affair

ALLAHABAD, India, Jan. 4. (UP)—Afghan Auth ordered the arrest of Col. Thomas E. Lawrence, famous British adventurer and army officer, on the belief that he has been assisting rebels in the present uprising to cross the frontier, according to advices received here tonight.

Lawrence, known as "Lawrence of Arabia" because of his war-time adventures, was described by authorities as "the arch spy of the world."

Photographs, supposed to be of Lawrence, were distributed among Afghan army commanders. It was reported from Delhi that rumors were current concerning plans for a fresh assault on Kabul, capital of Afghanistan, which was successfully defended recently by government troops when insurgents attacked. The rebel tribesmen revolted against King Amanullah's reform laws. The brigand leader, Bachha Sakao, was said to be collecting a fresh force of insurgents for a march on Kabul. The insurgents were reported better armed than the government troops. Apparently the situation had

Only immediate relatives of the youthful offenders were allowed in the courtroom during the trials. The curious being excluded by orders of the court.

Question Mark Breaking Records

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 4. (UP)—Intent on breaking all records for sustained flight by aircraft of any kind, the great army plane Question Mark circled over protected San Fernando valley tonight with three records already battered.

Demonstration Greets Men At 3:36:45 p. m. the plane passed its 80th hour in the air, each added hour strengthening the newly acquired honors. A wild demonstration on the ground and in the sky greeted the Question Mark late today as it returned to its Van Nuys base from Imperial Valley, where it cruised as it broke the world's endurance record for heavier-than-air craft shortly after midnight.

Twenty planes from Metropolitan field cut capers about the big ship in tribute to the five history-making fliers in its cabin. Records Smashed With three records—American endurance refueling, world's sustained flight—now bettered, the Question Mark had as its immediate objective the 118-hour mark of the ill-fated French dirigible Dixmude for lighter-than-air craft.

If it breaks the Dixmude's mark the Question Mark will have been in sustained flight longer than any other airship.

Coolidge Lauds Pan-American Group on Work

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4. (UP)—After having completed its agenda of work with the unanimous adoption this morning of two far-reaching treaties on arbitration and conciliation, the Pan-American conference on conciliation and arbitration tonight received the congratulations of President Coolidge.

The president, it was made known in an authoritative statement from the White House, is highly pleased over the fact that the conference has reached a complete accord on all the issues before it. The president's view is that the agreement of the conference reflects a high spirit of conciliation on the part of the delegates and their governments.

The fact that the conference was in session when the conflict between Bolivia and Paraguay arose and was able to effect an amicable settlement of this dangerous South American outbreak, was held by Mr. Coolidge to be particularly significant and gratifying.

A plenary session of the conference in the Pan-American union this morning was devoted to formal adoption of the inter-American treaty on obligatory arbitration and the convention among the American nations on compulsory conciliation.
