

Klamath Cattlemen Endorse Proposed Theft Legislation

Klamath county cattlemen met yesterday at the office of County Agent C. A. Henderson and after a lengthy discussion passed a resolution favoring legislation drafted by a committee from the State Cattle and Horse Breeders Association which is aimed to curtail stealing of beef.

Several minor changes were suggested in the proposed law by local cattlemen, but substantially they endorsed the committee's work.

The legislation is aimed to make difficult the disposition of beef by other than the legal owner. Sanitary slaughter conditions are also incorporated in the legislation.

Cattlemen from all parts of the county, 27 in all, attended the meeting and discussed the measure which will, it is hoped, prevent an annual loss to cattlemen in this section of from \$25,000 to \$40,000.

The legislation will again be referred to the drafting committee of the state association which will incorporate the suggested changes. The bill will then be presented to the state legislature with the combined support of all cattlemen of the state.

Carkin Tax Group Changes Offset Provision Planned

PORTLAND, Jan. 5. (UP).—The Carkin property tax relief commission today reversed its action on its "property tax offset" provision of the personal income tax bill which it proposes to recommend to the coming legislature.

The recommendation now provides that everyone within the scope of the law will be required to pay at least 25 per cent of the income tax chargeable to him, regardless of the amount of his property tax payments.

The agreement came after long debate and the result of it, should the bill finally become effective as a law, will be to increase the revenue possible to be derived from its administration by something like \$500,000, or a total approximating \$1,500,000 annually.

A graduated schedule of rates was agreed upon commencing at 3 per cent for net income up to and including \$5,000; 4 per cent from \$5,000 up to and including \$10,000, and 5 per cent on excess of \$10,000.

Exemptions of \$1500 for single and \$2500 for married taxpayers is provided with an additional exemption of \$400 for each dependent under 18 years of age.

The bill also provided that whatever revenue is returned from the measure shall be applied to state purposes and the full amount considered in establishing the real property levy as a reduction in the amount of state revenue to be raised.

Should the law become effective and the revenue hold to the estimate, it would result in a reduction of direct levy on real property for state purposes of approximately 1.5 mills.
