attitude in the plan but raised the question of finance—a question which is bound to perplex any court at different times. There appeared to be no way that money could be raised off-hand for such a purpose as the court exposed to condition of the different funds to view, each showing that about all carrying possibilities had been loaded on that could be cared for at the present time.

Even with that condition plainly visible, it was the wish of the court to find some way in possible to help solve the armory problem. The matter was placed in the hands of Captain Ables to procure plans and estimates of cost, also to present a proposition from the Legion, and then meet again to go further into the problem.

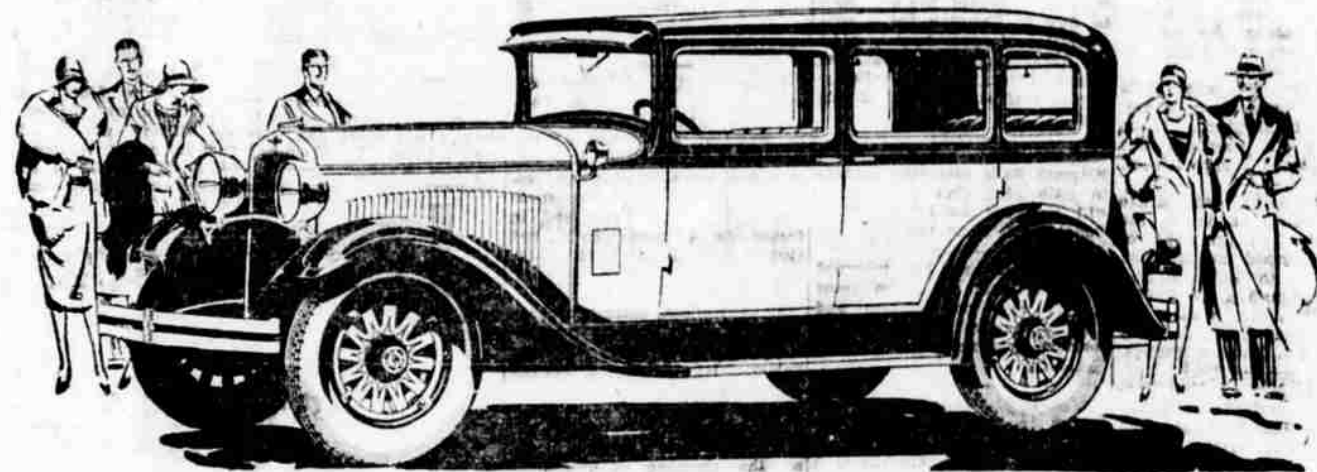
