ready to give us his opinion on
any legal questions that came
up, and we have never yet got-
ten into trouble by following his
advice.

The Council

A year ago I suggested seven
different projects that I thought
should be completed during the
year, namely: Sewers, street
lighting, paving of Oregon ave-
nue, isolation hospital, city zon-
ing, improvements of the cem-
tery and the garbage franchise.

Of the seven, four are com-
pleted. The sewer program was
too large to complete in one
year but it is well on the way,
leaving two projects—street
lighting and zoning—not only in-
complete but apparently dead.

As to the street lighting, it
was dropped for lack of a suit-
able way to finance it. The origi-
nal plan, that of having the
property owners benefited by the
bill, was protested by the prop-
erty owners and the matter was
taken out of the hands of the
council and put to a vote of the
people as to whether or not it
should be paid for by general
taxation, and was defeated. I
believe the council should leave
the question of revising this pro-
ject up to the property owners,
and the chamber of commerce.

The city zoning has been laid
aside because of the great
amount of work caused by the
large paving and sewer program,
but as our city grows it becomes
more evident that zoning is very
necessary to its proper develop-
ment, and I am going to put
zoning first on my list of recom-
mendations for this year.

Rock Macadam in Mills Addition
Now that East Main street is
paved, I believe Mills Addition
will become a real residential
and business district and I
would like to see the property
owners petition the council to
put in sidewalks, curbs and rock
macadam on Division, Martin and
Adams streets and on the inter-
secting streets. Southern Sixth
street and the Southern Pacific
tracks. By putting these streets
all in one unit, we should get a
very good price on the work and
I believe the property benefited
will stand the improvement.

Sewers
Now that our trunk line is
under construction and will pro-
vide an outlet for additional sev-
erage, local units should be con-
structed by the balance of Mills
Addition, Riverside, California
avenue district and Hot Springs
from Portland street to the city
limits.

Street Busses
I believe the time has arrived
when the council should adver-
tise for bids granting a franchise
for street busses.

New Charter
Although we will be hand-
capped somewhat by the lack of
funds for this work, we should
make some definite plans to pro-
vide the city with a new charter.

O. C. & E. Income Bonds
I am not able to make any re-
port on the settlement of these
bonds at the present time, but
hope to be able to do so within
the next few weeks.

Armory
The local National Guard is
starting a movement to get an
armory in Klamath Falls and I
would recommend that the coun-
cil go on record as favoring any
suitable plan advanced by them.

Tonight you finish six years of
faithful service to the city of
Klamath Falls, and while we
have not been able to agree with
you at all times, we have always
felt that you were honest in your
opinions. You are to be com-
mended on your police court
work—it is a record of which
you may well be proud. I am
sure the council joins me in wish-
ing you success in whatever line
of endeavor you may choose to
follow.

Mrs. Dixon:
You have had a big job for
the amount of money you have

received, but you have performed
your duties faithfully and well,
and I feel sure the council, as
well as myself, appreciate your
work.

While we welcome Mr. Rich-
mond and Mr. Butler to our city
family and we are sure that they
will fill their offices with credit
to themselves and their wards, it
is with a feeling of the deepest
regret that we say good-bye to
Mr. Balager and Mr. Peliz, and
I hardly know how to express
the appreciation of the council
and myself for the valuable ser-
vices you have rendered. Suffice
it to say that you have always
been willing to co-operate, have
been honest in the positions you
have taken and have never let
personal feelings enter into any
discussions. Your intelligence
and sound business judgment
have been a guiding hand in the
administration of city affairs for
the past two years that has been
a big help to the rest of us, and
I am sure that your work has
been appreciated, not only by us,
but by the entire city. Although
you are going out of public life,
I sincerely hope you will keep up
your interest in city affairs
through the chamber of com-
merce or the service clubs, so
gained while in office will not be
lost in the city entirely.

I wish to thank the balance
of the council and the heads of the
various departments for their
earnest support and co-operation
throughout the entire year.
