

McLarnin Wins Over Joe Glick Before Big Crowd

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, NEW YORK, Jan. 11. (UP)—Before the largest crowd that ever showed its way into Madison Square Garden, Jimmy McLarnin, from the far coast, punched his way to a clean-cut victory over Joe Glick of Wilkesburg, tonight in the ten-round bout which was the first of the big sports arena since the death of Tex Rickard.

Before the main bout, lights were dimmed and "tips" were sounded out of respect to the late promoter, and the size of the throng, which numbered 19,000 paid admissions, testified to the fact that boxing is on the upward despite the loss of its greatest asset.

McLarnin, who was Rickard's choice as the leading junior welterweight, had only a slight advantage in poundage over his opponent, tipping the beam at 137 1/2, compared with 136 for Glick.

The coast boxer showed a faster left hand than in any of his previous bouts, and beat the Wilkesburg pants presser to the punch repeatedly, having the

better of seven of the ten rounds. McLarnin was a vastly improved all-around fighter as compared with his previous New York appearances, despite the sensational knockout he scored over Sid Terris in one round last year.

While Jimmy probably is not comfortable at the lightweight limit of 135 pounds, he undoubtedly spoiled Glick's chances for a title bout with Sammy Mandell.

Glick fought fairly, and was mixing it with his conqueror until the final bell, but the referee, Patsy Haley, and both judges agreed that the Californian had won easily, outboxing and outpunching his opponent.

The gross receipts for the bout were \$71,158.70, the largest sum taken in during a so-called "popular priced" bout in the new garden.

Pelican City Five Beat Ashland Team By 46 to 39 Score

PELICAN CITY, Jan. 11.—The Pelicans won 46 to 39 from the Ashland normal school five here tonight in one of the fastest basketball games seen here recently.

The game was close, with first one side being ahead and then the other, from the time the first whistle blew until within the last three minutes of play, when the Pelicans broke a tie and forged ahead.

Shortly after Frank Hall, referee, blew the starting whistle, Louis Anderson sank the first shot for two points for the Pelicans. Players slipped, pivoted, dribbled, feinted, passed and shot with uncanny accuracy making baskets. Guards checked so closely that it was a real problem for the forwards to slip by them to shoot.

Peterson, Pelican center, was high point man with 12 points. Caldwell and Wilson, of the teachers, played good ball, and were tied for second place with 11 counters each. Wakenan, Pelican guard, played a stellar game and contributed his share

to the win by turning in 10 points.

Louis Anderson played a good game, making nine points before he was taken from the game in the second half on fouls. Peterson was sent in at guard and Benson, guard, was shifted to a forward position, where he performed with equally pleasing ability.

Peterson, from his own foul line, dropped two long shots in the normal school basket, and got his share of the tips-off. Wakenan played a fast game, picking many balls off the backboard, but was held to seven points by close checking. Peterson, at anchor, played the best game so far this season.

Wilson, Ashland center, started fast, dropping the ball through the hoop three times in the first half. Peterson was the only normal school player to go out on fouls. He was replaced by Haines, a colored lad whose sweater bore the same number as the black eight ball. He was fast and hard to stop. McGee and Ramsby, guards, played hard games and checked closely.

Tonight the same teams will again meet at the Pelican gym, and the Ashland boys will try to even the score if possible.

Score keeper for the game was Dan Howard, and Pruitt and Moore acted as timekeepers.

In a preliminary to the main game, the Hickey-Dinks won the second game from the boys of Lamm's mill by the score of 13 to 5.

Klamath Hi Loses To Medford Team

Before a large audience, some of which had to be seated in the huge auditorium, the Klamath union high school basketball team met defeat last night in a game with the Medford high school five, by a score of 23-22.

On through three quarters the first valley team threw basket after basket, while the Klamath quintet followed slowly behind, scoring now and then. Medford has a team of big men, larger than the Klamath boys, but the same was clean and fast. More fouls were called on the local team than on Medford.

The Klamath pep band provided music and entertainment between quarters and at the half, keeping the students' spirits up to the hope that a miracle might happen. This was the third game of the season for the local team.
