It will be a bad day for the race when the polar regions have been completely explored. There is a tonic to the daily stories of adventure in the land of everlasting snow that we will miss when the Arctic and Antarctic have finally been mapped and catalogued to the last square mile.

Sir Hubert Wilkins, flying over wastes of ice and snow at the bottom of the world, is doing his bit to hasten that day. He discovers that Graham Land is separated from the Antarctic continent by a long arm of the sea, and notes half a dozen new islands which must go on all future maps. Incidentally, he and Lieut. Carl Eielson risk their lives repeatedly to make these discoveries.

Now all of this makes very interesting reading, even though we who read it never heard of Graham Land before, have only the haziest idea where it is and can't for the life of us see what difference it makes whether it is part of the Antarctic continent or not. It is one of those places that we take on faith; we shall never go there, and we shall never talk with anyone who is going there.

But, for all that, the stories of Sir Hubert's discoveries make interesting reading. Despite the fact that he is covering the region in a modern airplane, his story is only a new chapter in the old, old story that was begun countless centuries ago by the first Phoenician captain who dared to poke his rickety craft out beyond Gibraltar, and continued, through the ages, by Columbus, Magellan, Froberisher, Cook and Peary.

This story is more than a summary of brave deeds and dreadful hardships. It is one of our most priceless possessions; a long epic of the human race's inexhaustible thirst for knowledge, an eternal testimonial of its capacity for going to dark places and braving death in desolate seas.

Workers Plan to March to London

LONDON, Jan. 11, (UP)—Plans for a great "march of the unemployed" on London to demand government action for relief of jobless thousands were announced today by the national unemployed workers committee. A thousand men from all parts of England, Scotland and Wales would converge on London and Prime Minister Baldwin's offices about February 24, according to the present plans. The march would end at Whitehall, where a charter of demands would be presented to the government.

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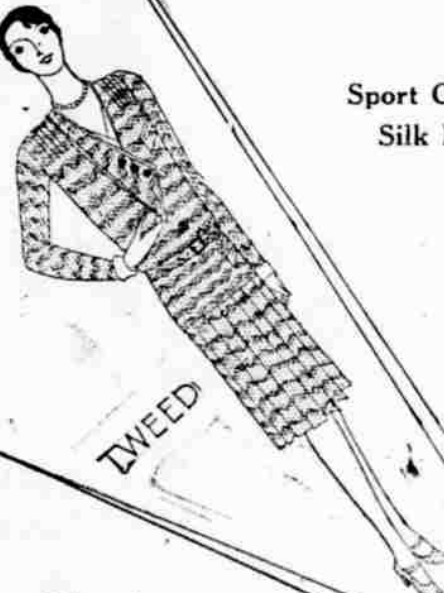
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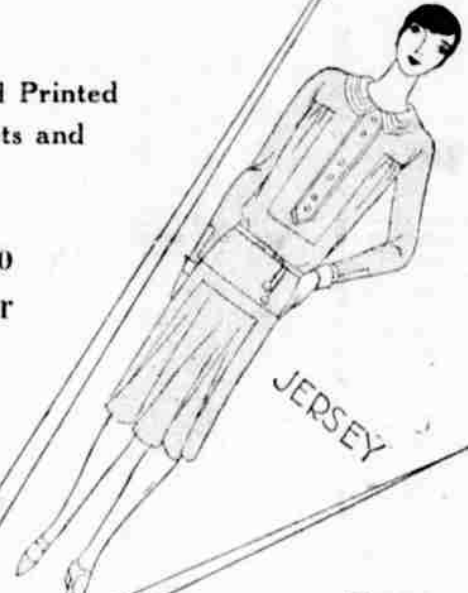

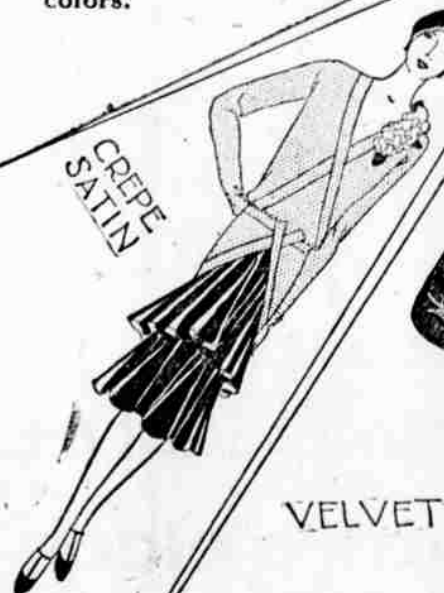
