

Tommy Armour Is Lone Par Shot In Golf Tourney

RIVIERA COUNTRY CLUB, Los Angeles, Jan. 11 (UP).—Only Tommy Armour of Washington, D. C., could crack par in the first round of the \$10,000 Los Angeles open tournament today, finishing three strokes under par for a brilliant 68.

The former national open champion was two strokes to the good with a 33 on the way out and beat par by one stroke on the way in with a 35.

The veteran MacDonald Smith, who is defending the honor he won last year, had a par 71 to divide second place with Horton Smith, the Joplin, Mo., youngster and blonde George von Elm, who once won the national amateur title from Bobby Jones.

Next to them came Bob Supple of Chicago, who led the field the greater part of the day with a 72. Supple was tied with Henry Cule, the Bridgeport, Conn., ace and Al Watrous of Detroit, who had the same scores for the first 18 holes.

A. Acherblom, a little known entrant from Little Rock, Ark., and Frank Walsh of Appleton, Wis., followed with cards of 73 each.

Only a stroke behind them were Ed Dudley, unattached, Mortie Dutra of Tacoma, Wash., and Al Espinosa of Chicago.

Lieut. Angell, the pilot, took seven enlisted men passengers for the return trip. When the plane appeared over Royallton, farmers in the vicinity rushed out of doors from their luncheon, noticing an unfamiliar sound from the engines.

None Dives Into Earth
It was obvious to them that the machine was trying desperately to gain height. It failed, and side-slipped. Skiffing piloting seemed to right it for a moment. Then it slipped again. A wing tip caught the branches of a tree, so lightly that the brittle branches were not damaged. Then the plane itself nose-dived into the frozen earth, boring with its prow a hole several feet deep.

Residents for half a mile around heard the impact. They reached the scene of the crash, dangerously near a farmhouse, to find a mass of wreckage.

Find Dead Bodies
It was necessary to use saws to clear the wreckage so that the mangled pilot could be rescued. Two other men were taken out, including Sergt. Conroy, the surviving eighth man. So compressed was the wreckage of the plane after its plunge, it was thought they were the only occupants.

Rescuers forced their way into the big cabin, however, and found the bodies of the five remaining men, all dead.

Army officials hazarded the conjecture that one of the three engines of the plane had failed. An investigation will be made.

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Jim Reed Attacks Kellogg's Treaty

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"There are matters of self-defense and wars of defense are not only reserved under the treaty, but such action is permitted to say what it considers self-defense. No nation has waited in 100 years that did not elect to war in self-defense."
