Berman Tells of Alleged Bribes

(Continued from Page One)

Berman, who originally was a
defendant in the present bribery
case, turned state's evidence and
charges against him were dis-
missed.

Just "Retainer Fee"

This first \$10,000 was in the
nature of a "retainer fee," he
said. To get Getzoff to consider
his case and determine if it could
be taken before Keyes.

Subsequently he testified he
was "milked" for \$100 a week
"entertainment fee" paid to Getz-
off, a \$500 "gift" to Getzoff,
\$7500 to pay on a new home
Keyes was buying, \$100 for an
automobile for Keyes daughter,
\$2500 for an automobile for
Getzoff, another \$10,000 on
Keyes home, \$5000 to Getzoff
for his good services, and a set
of golf clubs and a chaise longue,
both gifts to Keyes.

Acquitted in Return

These donations were made in
the order named. Berman said
that he paid most this in cash,
but one check for \$1500 was in-
troduced by the state. In return,
he said, he was promised first
dismissal, but when that seemed
improbable, acquittal was sub-
stituted.

After the jury had returned
its verdict dismissing Ed Rosen-
berg, Berman and other Julian
defendants, Rosenberg, Berman
and Keyes met in Getzoff's pants
pressing establishment and en-
gaged in a "sort of jubilee," Ber-
man recounted.

"Glad You Were Acquitted"

"I'm glad you were acquitted,"
Berman quoted Keyes as having
said. "How did you like the
verdict?"

"I told him I was satisfied,"
Berman said, "and I thanked him
for not bearing down on me in
his talk to the jury. Getzoff
told me Keyes had arranged to
sort of forget me when he sum-
med the state's case."

At another point in his testi-
mony Berman said, "Rosenberg
told me he paid \$125,000 to
Keyes to get his case fixed."

Berman recounted that he
bought gifts or handed over cash
only under duress from Ben Getz-
off, who acted as an official
clearing house between the dis-

trict attorney's office and the
Julian defendants.

today. He was dependent over
his failure to solve the murder
of a girl whose body was found

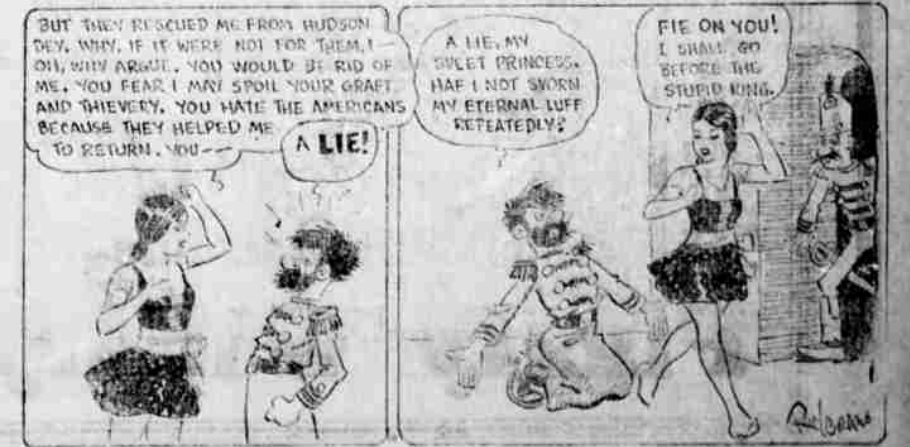
