

Garden Directors Approve Fight at Miami Beach Ring

NEW YORK, Jan. 15, (UP)—The directors of Madison Square Garden today gave their provisional approval to the proposed Sharrkey-Strickling match at Miami Beach next month, and William F. Carey, the new titular head of the Garden corporation, will leave for the south Tuesday to assist Jack Dempsey in the promotion of the bout.

While the board will not meet officially until tomorrow, Col. John E. Hammond, general manager of the Garden, announced that everything necessary had been agreed to, and that Carey would not even have to wait for the official meeting before proceeding to Miami Beach.

The business of actual contracts with the fighters has been kept in abeyance, but apparently those in charge of affairs since Tex Rickard's death are confident that they will be able to carry out the late promoter's plans for the Sharrkey-Strickling fight.

What prompts the officials of Madison Square Garden to push ahead with the bout is fear of another kind of loss, however. The prestige of the group which has succeeded Tex Rickard would suffer considerably if it had to confess that it could not carry out the late promoter's plans.

Reinhart Has Best Record

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 14, (Special).—It has been said that a basketball coach is not better than his record. If that is true, then Billy Reinhart, coach at Oregon, is the best basketball coach in the northwest, for Billy's teams have won more conference games from each of their northern opponents than they lost.

In the five years that Billy has been coaching at Oregon, no team of his has ever lost to Montana or Washington State. The records show that Reinhart-coached quintets have beaten the Gonzaga 10 and the Grizzlies six consecutive times.

Washington has made the best showing against Oregon of any of the West's northern opponents. The Huskies lost six games to Oregon and won four. Idaho and Oregon State college were each defeated seven out of 10 times by the Webfoots.

Reinhart's sum total of regularly scheduled conference games include 35 victories as compared to 10 losses, four of which came in his first year as coach.

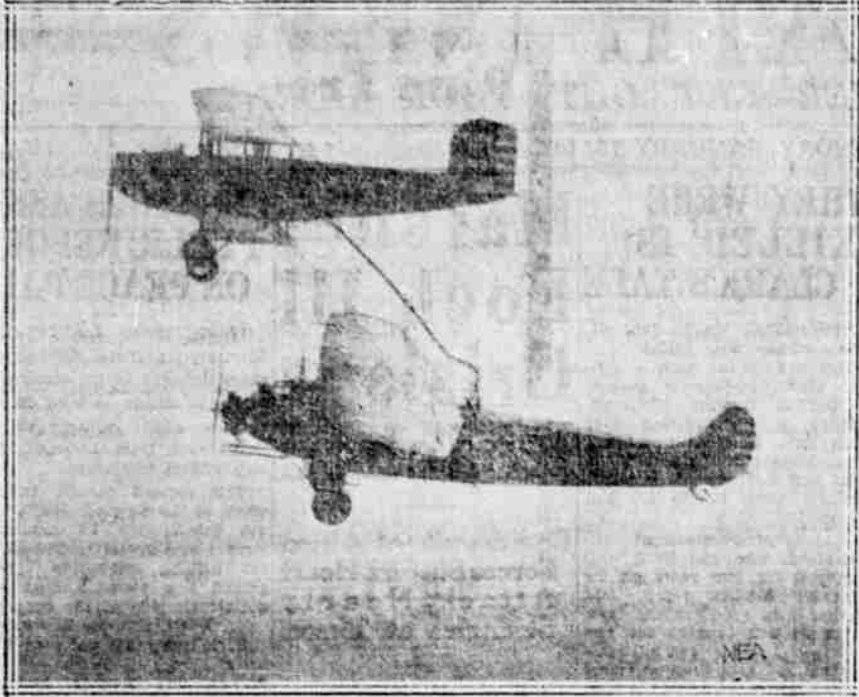

ford accused his uncle. "I didn't want them killed, but I knew they would go and tell how he abused them."

"They were to be killed with an axe. It wouldn't make any noise that way for people to hear, Gordon told me."

Dug Grave in Henhouse

Sanford testified that on the day previous to the killings he worked from morning to evening digging a grave in the floor of a henhouse. He said that Northcott made him dig the excavation in addition to his chores and came in several times during the day to note progress.

"In the afternoon the boys were separated and we took Lewis into the house," Sanford testified. "Then we gave him ether. Stewart said he was going to try to do it that way because it would be easier than with an axe. But Lewis woke up in about an hour, just sick. We didn't try it on Nelson."

Father On Stand

The state introduced in evidence an ether can, which Sanford identified as the one used in the death attempt.

During their week and a half confinement in the Northwest chicken coop the boys played cards and drew pictures, the accused slayer's nephew declared.

When the state introduced an old brown cap found on the farm, N. H. Winslow, father of the boys, said it "looks like a cap Nelson bought two years ago," but Savary forced him to admit that the boy often mislaid his cap.

ARMOUR LOSES FIRST MONEY

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 14, (UP)—Although he took seven strokes on the par four final hole, which darkness prevented him from playing Sunday, Tommy Armour, of Washington, D. C., won second money in the Los Angeles \$10,000 open golf tournament today.

Armour's 291 for the complete 72 holes earned him \$1750. The \$3500 first prize, won Sunday by MacDonald Smith, of Great Neck, L. I., was within Armour's reach when he started the final 36 holes with a seven-stroke lead over the field, but he cracked badly.

Armour would have had 289 had he shot par golf on the last hole today, but his ball landed in a tree-trunk and he was forced to lift out for a one-stroke penalty. He three-putted the green.

Leo Diegel, of Azusa, Calif., took a par 3-4 for the last two holes and finished only a stroke behind Armour with 292. He edged in ahead of Horton Smith for third money of \$875.

Smith, young Joplin, Mo., star, took a final 294 Sunday before darkness halted the last three-comes. Tied with him was Geo. Von Elm, Detroit amateur, who shot the 18th hole in par four today. Smith got fourth money of \$600, Von Elm being an amateur.

Giants Receive Two Contracts

NEW YORK, Jan. 14, (UP)—The New York Giants received today the signed contracts of Melvin Ott and Tony Kaufmann, outfielders. Ott came the Giants as a schoolboy sensation a few seasons ago, while Kaufmann, formerly a pitcher, hit 400 as an outfielder with Rochester last year.

Friday she left a note for her mother and drove away in her car. The note said:

Leaves Note

"If I do not come home, look for me at the Bowl and Pitcher." When she did not reappear Saturday, it was assumed she had gone to Seattle to visit friends. Before another 24 hours were over, a search was started. Police found her body in a snow bank by the rapids, where her note had indicated she would be. In a handbag beside her body were several letters to Fink telling her story.

Fink surrendered voluntarily to police. He said the \$150,000 in securities was in the Old National Bank vault.

A marriage license was issued yesterday at the office of the county clerk to John P. Orr, of the Lake hotel, and Eunice Waecheit, 2234 Orchard street.

The five who look to be the best in the division, other than Mandell, are Ray Miller, Rite Terrolle, Joe Medill, Jimmy McLarin and Bruce Flowers.

Jimmy McLarin and Miller are the "standouts" of the group. McLarin already has had a chance at Mandell's crown and about all he received was a fine boxing lesson from the champion.

Jimmy outboxed Joe Gillick in New York the other night and appears to be easily improved, but he is still crawling. It is doubtful if he can make the lightweight limit (light now without fighting under weight).

Atlantic City, Jan. 14, (UP)—The national amateur billiard champion, J. N. Roseman of Vallejo, automatically forfeited his title here today when he failed to appear for the Pacific coast eliminations of the 1929 tournament.
