

Formulates Plan To Select Champ Football Team

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15. (AP)—A plan to select an actual national football champion each year has been suggested by John W. Heisman, former Georgia Tech and Pennsylvania coach, in a letter to H. C. (Curly) Byrd, football director at the University of Maryland.

Heisman proposed dividing the country into four sections and from each choosing the best team to meet teams of other sections in elimination contests that would end two Saturdays after the end of the regular playing season.

His first division would be composed of states east of Ohio and north of the Mason-Dixon line. In the second division would fall teams below the Mason-Dixon line and east of the Mississippi river. The third division would include the midwest states from Pennsylvania to the Rocky mountains and the southern states lying west of the Mississippi river. In his final group would be the far western teams in states west of the Rocky mountains.

Heisman pointed out that all teams would have to agree to abandon other post-season games to make the plan successful and declared that whereas critics might say that the season would be too prolonged, it would be for only four teams out of 100.

NEW YORK, Jan. 15. (UP)—The enthusiasm of the south for the first potential heavyweight champion that region ever had is counted upon by the Madison Square Garden corporation, and its titular head, William F. Carey, to make a success of the proposed heavyweight elimination bout between Young Stribling of Georgia and Jack Sharkey of Boston on February 27 at Miami Beach, Fla.

Carey left for the south tonight, with plans patterned after those lines along which the late Tex Rickard conducted his matches. He will go into conference immediately with southern railroads, and no efforts will be spared to interest southerners in Stribling's chances of wearing the crown which Gene Tunney voluntarily surrendered last year.

Fight Tickets at Depot All railroads carrying passen-

gers to Florida will sell tickets for the fight at the same windows which sell transportation. The plan was tried by Rickard in connection with the second Dempsey-Tunney at Chicago, and worked successfully, so the new head of Madison Square Garden will use it on the occasion of the proposed Sharkey-Stribling bout.

The signing of Young Stribling at Miami Beach today seemed to make the fight next month a certainty, and Carey left with the assurance of the directors of the Garden that they would support the affair financially.

Jack Dempsey will be the Tex Rickard of this bout, Carey said just before his departure, indicating that the former heavyweight champion will be the figure-head in the match, while more experienced business men here in New York will see that no dollars are wasted.

Simplicity of cooling system is a feature of the new Ford
