## Northcott Seeks To Quiz Nephew

factory to him, he would withdraw from the case.

## Took Extension Course

"I've taken a three years extension course from the University of Southern California and I think I'm more qualified to handle the questioning than Sayre, and that's what I intend to do," Northcott told the United Press correspondent.

The asserted player's decision to take charge of the case was announced just after young Clark had concluded his testimony by stripping to the waist and displaying bruises and burns which he said Northcott inflicted on the alleged "murder farm."

## Buried Boy Alive

Clark testified that Lewis Winslow of Pomona, one of the three boys for whose death Northcott is on trial, was still alive when he was buried in the farm chicken coop.

"He was still making a noise when we buried him," the 14-year-old witness said.

Sanford told of the axe-slashing of the Winslow brothers, Lewis and Nelson. He said that Nelson was taken to the henhouse first and that he was forced to talk to him while Stewart beat him with the axe.

Then, he declared, Northcott made him strike a few blows. After Nelson had been placed in the grave dug in the coop, Lewis was beaten. This time, he said, Northcott made him strike the victim first.

## Hauled Blood Away

As they covered the bodies in the grave with straw "Lewis was making a noise," Sanford testified. As soon as the excavation was covered chickens were turned into the coop and bloody soil put in a wheelbarrow and carried some distance down a road, according to Northcott's nephew.

The boys, he repeated, were killed to conceal abuse to which they were subjected.
