NEW YORK, Jan. 16, (UP)—Former Gov. Alfred E. Smith, defeated presidential candidate, emerged tonight still the fighting leader he was in the recent campaign.

In a nationally broadcast radio speech, Smith appealed to democrats, rank and file even more than leaders, to keep their fighting organization intact, to strengthen it now in preparation for next election, and to keep it alive and fighting all the time until 1932.

There was nothing in the speech regarding disunions among some democrats as to the desirability of his leadership. He

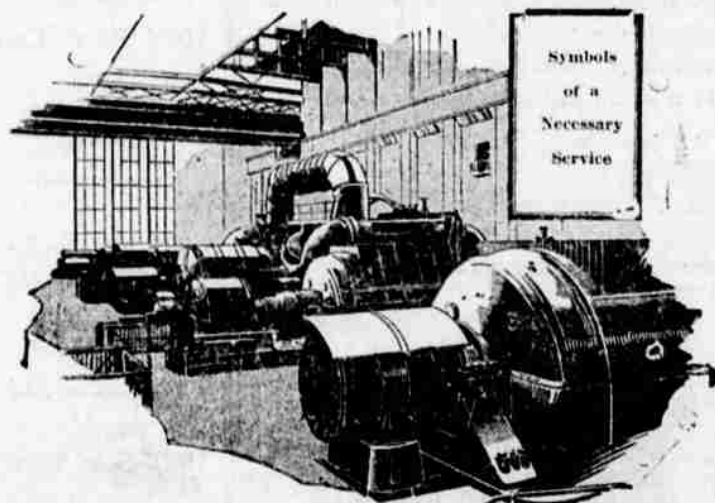
