Oregon Swimmers Break Records

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 17 (Special)—The University of Oregon medley team, which unofficially broke the national inter-collegiate 200-yard medley record only last week, will appear in exhibition in Portland Saturday at the city championship swimming meet.

They are Johnny Anderson, who swims the 100-yard free stroke; Frank Walton, the 100-yard back stroke; and Tommy Blankenberg, the 100-yard breast stroke.

Anderson is swimming his second year on the varsity. He holds several Pacific coast conference records. Blankenberg and Walton are freshmen, hence are not eligible for the varsity. Blankenberg was a member of the American Olympic team. He is national A. A. C. champion in the 200-meter breast stroke. Walton is a former Olympic club star and one of the leading backstroke swimmers in the country.

Plan Remodeling Of Penitentiary After Hearings

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 17. (AP)—If a fire were to break out in the Oregon penitentiary the holocaust would be more serious than the recent disaster at the Munmouth normal school, Henry W. Meyers, superintendent of the prison, told the ways and means committee Wednesday night.

This was corroborated by Representative A. G. Rushlight of Portland, chairman of the house wing of the committee, who, with Senator Staples, chairman of the senate committee, and Governor Patterson recently inspected the prison.

The upshot was that the committee voted to recommend immediately an appropriation of \$35,000 to meet the emergency. Governor Patterson urged action forthwith, and said that if action by the committee were favorable the state board of control would, Thursday instruct Superintendent Meyers to begin the improvements.

The prison will use \$35,000 to turn the old state training school near Turner into an intermediate institution for young prisoners, first offenders and women, and \$18,000 will be used to complete a prison garage, which will have a second story with sleeping accommodations for 102 inmates. This will relieve the congested condition that has been puzzling prison authorities for nearly two years. Superintendent Meyers told prison authorities that the population of the prison has gained 500 per cent in 10 years.

Farmers Receive Trees From State

Notification has been received from the State Forest Nursery that trees are now available for distribution to farmers throughout Oregon. The following varieties being available for Eastern Oregon: Black locust, green ash, box elder, Russian alderberry, western yellow pine. These trees are supplied to farmers of Oregon to be used in establishing windbreaks, shelter belts, wood lots, and are not to be used for ornamental purposes. The cost of the trees at Corvallis, where the tree nursery is located, is 25¢ per 100, deposit to be made with the order at this rate. When the trees arrive, express on order is paid by purchaser. Total cost is generally from 75¢ to \$1.00 per 100, delivered in Klamath Falls.

The trees are yearling and are supposed to be particularly adapted to the various sections of Oregon. It is advisable that any one wishing trees present their order to the County Agent immediately, calling in person in order to fill out the necessary blanks that must go with all orders. It is planned to order a large number at one time and anyone desiring these trees should place their orders immediately, as supply is limited and orders are filled in the order that they are received.

Legion Considers Sponsoring Fights

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 17. (AP)—Whether the American Legion should sponsor a measure in the legislature to create a state boxing commission that would supplant all local commissions was under discussion at a meeting of the legislative committee of the Legion here today.

Another feature of any proposed change in the laws governing organized boxing, it was said, might be provisions that a share of the profits of boxing shows be used for the maintenance of employment bureaus for war veterans.

Marshal Is Freed Of Murder Charge

ENTERPRISE, Ore., Jan. 17. (AP)—Fred Asher, former city marshal, was acquitted today of a charge of second-degree murder in connection with the fatal shooting of William Litch, last September. The jury deliberated for 12 hours. Asher fired upon Litch's automobile when it failed to stop upon his order. One of the bullets struck Lesma Chiswood, who was riding with Litch.

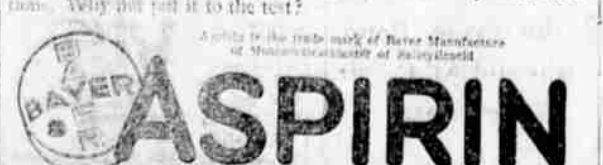
COMMISSION RE-ELECTED

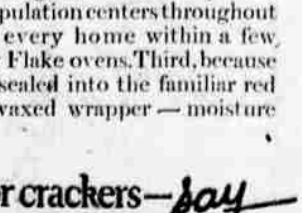

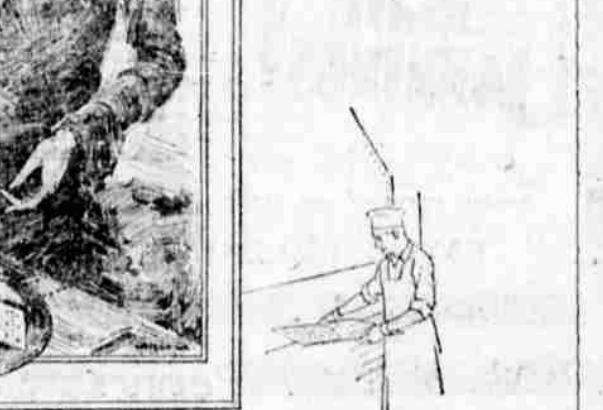
