BUYING THE NEW LICENSE.

An automobile must be licensed before it is allowed to run upon the streets and highways. Each state has the power to determine the amount of license a car shall pay. In Oregon the license fees are high, but no personal property tax is charged against the car.

In California the license fee is low, but the car is supposed to go on the personal property tax rolls. This is often dodged and thus we hear of the "low license in California and the high license in Oregon."

As a matter of fact if a car is licensed in California and pays its personal property tax in that state also, as the law intends, the California car pays about as much as the Oregon car, which pays what is apparently a high license but no personal property tax.

We notice at this time of year when cars must have new license plates, a number of California licenses on Oregon owned cars. Yes, licenses may be bootlegged across the border to a certain extent, but it is a bad practice and one that no full grown man can be proud of.

An Oregon man who lives in this state, earns his money here and has his property here can not afford to smuggle a license across the state line. He may think he can, but the time will come when all will understand that it does not pay.

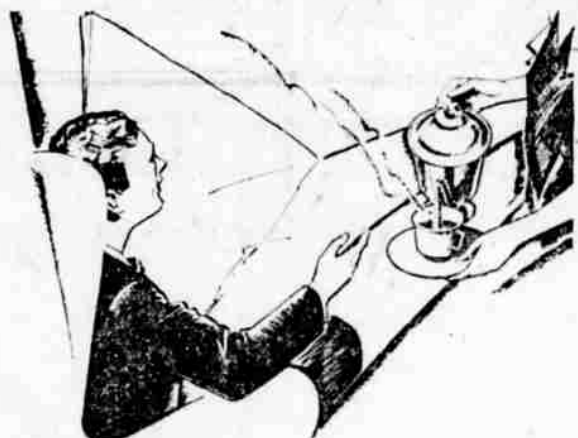
