Gould, the librarian, had a detailed report which she read and filed. All members of the court were deeply interested in the statement that the old Carnegie library now is an active institution. It is active because three libraries have been combined into one which serves not only the county high school pupils, but the rural districts as well. The report showed an exceptional advancement in library work and use of the books and equipment. A little kink in financing due to the board having to repair the roof, rebuild the furnace and clean up the place before school opened last fall, was soon ironed out and the board left the court to hit into other county matters, which were numerous.

The bids for culvert pipe were opened and laid on the table until next Tuesday's meeting.

Medford Appeals Judge Goddard was frequently interrupted by telephone calls, some of which were appeals for aid. All three of the Coolidge hold-over cabinet officers will remain in the valley only temporarily. Mellon until he completes his mission to serve ten years as the head of the treasury department, thus establishing a record. Jardine, during the enactment of Hoover's farm relief program, with which he is in thorough sympathy, and Wilbur until there is a vacancy on the federal bench. He formerly served on the California supreme court, where he made an excellent record.

Stimson, Houghton Removed Among those being considered are Alanson B. Houghton, ambassador to Great Britain and formerly ambassador to Germany, who has rented an apartment building where Mellon lives, and former secretary of War Henry L. Stimson, who more recently has received considerable commendation for his settlement of the Nicaraguan election dispute as personal representative of President Coolidge. Stimson now is governor-general of the Philippines, and it is understood he plans to return here soon.

Hughes Will Not Serve There was quite a flurry in Washington political circles today over reports that Hoover had offered former Secretary of State Hughes the post he filled once. It can be said authoritatively that Hughes will not be secretary of state.

Hoover, it is generally believed, will offer some post in his administration to Henry M. Robinson, Los Angeles banker and friend. There is uncertainty about the war department and

he might be appointed to this position.

Doak May Head Labor The secretary of labor will be a man closely affiliated with organized labor. William N. Doak, vice-president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, has received serious consideration. He was head of the labor bureau for the republican national committee during the campaign.

He is also from Virginia, one of the southern states Hoover carried.

Appointment of William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, has been suggested. Green, however, would not consider leaving his present position, it is understood. He was formerly a democrat, but supported Hoover for president.

Hoover is leaving his assistant, George Akerson, here to act as his liaison on cabinet and other matters while he is in Florida. Akerson, a former Minneapolis newspaperman, may be named Hoover's secretary.

## "Fun Murderer" Found Guilty by Jury in 40 Minutes

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 19. (AP)—A jury of salesmen, mechanics and small-salaried men took 40 minutes today to find George Marsh, 19-year-old "fun murderer" guilty of the "thrill hold-up" slaying of Willard Smith, Atlanta drug clerk.

The former college student faces death in the electric chair on March 15 for his crime.

Defendant Smirks

The verdict came with stunning swiftness, after a four-day trial marked by defense attempts to show that Marsh, the tall, suave attractive defendant, was an abnormal being, with mental traits which bordered on insanity.

Marsh took the verdict without emotion. His lips even opened in a quiver. His mother, Mrs. George Marsh, of Milwaukee, widow of a shoe manufacturer, cried, and the defendant's sister, Mrs. Jack Deway of Atlanta, collapsed.
