United Press. BY GEORGE KIRKSEY. United Press Staff Correspondent. NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—There is a different Jack Sharkey from the one widely disliked in the boxing world as "the loquacious Lithuanian," "the garrulous gob" and "the talkative tar."

Not "Two-Faced" Talking out of turn has ever been one of the shortcomings of the Boston heavyweight, but the world would have liked the good-natured fellow who sat in a big, easy chair at a quiet family hotel on upper Broadway today and told about himself.

"I'm not through," he said. "Why, I'm only beginning. Mentally and physically I'm perfect right now. My condition is better than it has been for two years. I was at top physical form the night I fought Jim Maloney in May, 1927. I weighed 192 that night. Yesterday I weighed 191. My best fighting weight."

in petty political bickering between athletic organizations. Charges made public this week to the effect that Nurm had been improperly persuaded to run in the Knights of Columbus games at Boston next Saturday night instead of in the Masonic benefit games here were repudiated today by the committee in charge of the Masonic meet. Jack Har-

ris, secretary of the committee, who made the charges, has been upgraded and forced to resign. In a letter to Dan J. Ferris, secretary of the A. A. U., Harris asserted that Nurm had virtually agreed to run for the Masons but had been persuaded to switch to the K. of C. meet by "men of power in track affairs." The letter hinted, moreover, that religious prejudice was involved and suggested by inference that Nurm's amateur standing was not all that it might be.

Despite the repudiation of Harris by the Masonic committee, therefore, the Metropolitan A. A. U., with which the Finn is registered, has decided to give the entire matter a thorough airing. The public, which will recall
