

### Sharkey, Christner Complete Training For Bout Friday

NEW YORK, Jan. 23. (UP)—Jack Sharkey in the biggest drawing card left in the fighting game.

The Boston heavyweight has drawn more money, exclusive of two co-heavyweight champions, Jack Dempsey and Gene Tunney, than any fighter that ever lived. In less than two years Sharkey has received \$250,000 for his services. He was paid \$211,000 for fighting Dempsey.

In six fights for the Madison Square Garden corporation the aggregate total approaches two millions. The receipts for Sharkey's six biggest fights follow:

Fighting a comparative novice Friday night in Madison Square Garden, Sharkey probably will draw one of the biggest rates of the winter season.

Both fighters completed training today. After boxing two rounds each with Italian Jack Herman and Paul Hoffman, German heavyweights, and going through his other routine exercises, Sharkey weighed 192.

In his workout, Sharkey paid particular attention to a defense for right-hand punches. It was Christner's right which finished Hansen.

Christner did no gymnasium work today but confined himself to roadwork and calisthenics. He also weighed 192.

What little betting there is favors Sharkey at 3 to 1 and even money that Christner does not last 10 rounds.

### Ryder Cup Team to Follow Stylist in Choosing Togs

NEW YORK, Jan. 23. (UP)—Walter Hagen, well known authority on correct attire, and a golfer of some repute, has decreed that members of the American Ryder cup team must strive for sartorial perfection in their annual matches with Great Britain this year.

As Captain of the Ryder golfers, Walter today came out with the announcement that his 1929 team, recently selected, would enjoy the aid of a "stylist" in the selection of the wardrobe they will require for the international matches.

Dave Frankel, for several years connected with the "best dressed" movement at national championships, has been named official "stylist" for the American team, and upon his judgment will rest the success or failure of the Americans in the matter of dress.

Hagen's announcement is sure to create comment among those persons who have been following golf for years under the impression that the quality of a person's game would have a direct bearing upon his golfing success.

### Henry Killilea, Johnson's Friend, Dies in Chicago

CHICAGO, Jan. 23. (UP)—When death took Henry Killilea today, fighting fan Johnson lost the kind of pal who sticks closest when the going is hardest.

Few men have enjoyed the type of friendship which existed between these two leaders of the baseball world, and Killilea's death takes away the friend who stood by Johnson throughout years of fighting over American league affairs.

The friendship was tested first back in the days when Johnson was battling to establish another major league, to compete with the National League. Killilea joined with Johnson, Charles Comiskey, Charley Somers and Matt Killilea and succeeded in founding the American league.

Shortly after 1900, the American league put a club in Boston and Killilea was placed in charge. He won the world's championship in 1903 and an American league pennant in 1904; but no world's series was played that year.

Then the cry for home ownership went up in Boston and Killilea sold out to John I. Taylor of the Boston Globe.

It was then that he and Johnson became almost inseparable. Ben constantly was fighting, Killilea stood by, and it was his advice that Johnson valued most.

For years this arrangement went on, with Killilea, who was a lawyer, sitting quietly behind the scenes advising Johnson in legal and other matters connected with various battles.

### Fishery Expert Visits Klamath

William Haulley, one of the best known anglers and fish experts in the state, and now superintendent of state fisheries, has arrived in Klamath Falls for the purpose of inspecting Seven Mile creek.

Mr. Haulley will the state game commissioner had a prior right on the stream and was out willing to relinquish it each year until after the egg taking season had passed.

### Cabinet Rumors Continue During Hoover Meetings

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Jan. 23. (UP)—President-elect Herbert Hoover began today to draft plans to build up an effective republican political organization below the national and Dixon line.

He started by inquiring of the southern republican leaders the reasons why he broke the hither-to solid south in the presidential election.

He inquired first of Stuart W. Cramer of Charlotte, N. C., prominent textile manufacturer, who took a leading part in Hoover's southern campaign and subsequently has been mentioned for the cabinet.

Cramer said, after his luncheon conference with the president-elect at the J. C. Penney estate, that he did not discuss cabinet matters and when informed he had been mentioned as likely secretary of the navy, asked:

"Is that all fixed? Nothing was told me about it."

Hoover will have a conference tomorrow morning with Dwight W. Morrow, ambassador to Mexico, who will arrive here from Nassau at 8 o'clock and have breakfast with the president-elect. Morrow has been mentioned for secretary of state in Hoover's cabinet.

Cabinet speculation, which is plentiful here, also includes the name of Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, president of Stanford University and friend of Hoover. He is a brother of Secretary of Navy Wilbur.

Soon after the Morrow conference, Hoover plans to start on a three-day fishing trip at Angel Fish creek, about 20 miles from here.

lution involving a time element is in general quite valid within restricted groups, as for instance in the horses, yet it must undergo a certain modification, for gaps are found in all of these evolutionary lines which seem to be real, that is were never, so far as we have been able to learn, bridged by so-called missing links.

This is a modification of the commonly accepted ideas of evolution in the direction of theory, known as the mutation theory, upheld by De Vries.

Some Gaps Broad

It is obvious that the gap between cats and dogs and their immediate relatives is quite broad, and it remains broad throughout the fossil record. Cats never become dogs; but both are carnivorous mammals.

Between the backboneed animals and the invertebrates, such as the insects, the gaps are very broad, and those peculiar types which are intermediate between them are widely different from either.

Have Affinities

Between the invertebrate groups, as insects, shells, starfishes, and so forth, the gaps are still broader. These gaps go back unchanged to the earliest fossils that we know, so that so far as these creatures are concerned we have no justification in assuming a time element in the evolutionary process.

So wide are the gaps between these various types of humbler creatures that these cannot be arranged in any sort of evolutionary line. But they do seem to fit perfectly well into a somewhat complicated diagram showing each to have affinities with several others, not merely with a single one.

Man Never Ape

This portion of the idea is wholly new; but it is very technical and it deals with creatures with names familiar only to specialists in zoology. It might possibly be described as an exaggerated application of the views of De Vries.

Regarding man, he is in structure very close to the man-like ape, but no link between the two ever has been found, and I do not believe that such a link ever existed. Of course, there may have been such a link, but until this is proved we have no justification in denying the facts and assuming its existence. So far as our knowledge goes, man appeared on earth in substantially the form in which we know him now.

### Growth of Farming Told by Henderson

850 cars shipped in 1928, with a probability that 950 cars will be shipped out this year.

Fine Potatoes Grown

During the past year good potato farmers made money, according to the county agent. A fine quality of potatoes is now being produced in the county, as evidenced by the fact that they were selected by both the Southern Pacific and Great Northern railroads for use on their dining cars.

Alfalfa, the principal hay crop, now covers nearly 20,000 acres of ground in the county. Klamath wheat crop is valued at \$600,000 annually, while it is estimated that alfalfa raised is worth \$700,000 a year.

Clover Seed New Crop

During the past year a carload of clover seed was shipped from the county, bringing in \$12,000. That the agricultural development is just starting in the county is evidenced by the fact that at the present time it is estimated that 145,000 acres of land is producing crops. This may be raised to 275,000 acres before all land tillable is in cultivation and producing to its best advantage, in Henderson's opinion.

Homesteads Opened

Large homesteads are being opened in the county. Only those who pass examinations and qualify before a board may file. During the past year, 29 persons took out homesteads, bringing the total to 153. Of that number not one reported a failure in crops, showing the result of the examinations in securing desirable settlers. It is expected that as many more will take out claims this year.

One reason ascribed for the productivity of the county is the water supply, which Mr. Henderson termed "best in the west." At the present time over a million acre feet of water is available to nourish the crops during the dry season.
