

### Sharkey Expected To K. O. Christner In Five Rounds

NEW YORK, Jan. 24. (UP)—Now that the prowess of K. O. Christner has been sufficiently extolled and all the cash customers, except to general admission boys, have bought and paid for their seats for Friday night's affair, it is permissible to admit that Jack Sharkey probably will flatten the Akron rubber puddler inside the half-hour mark.

Sharkey will have to bet pretty bad not to do so, for the Ohio heavyweight has demonstrated that he has no science, and just one punch, a cumbersome right-hand reminiscent of those once thrown by Luis Angel Firpo, the Bull of the Pampas.

There have been one-punch fighters ever since prize fighting began, but few of them can be recalled today. The boxer with one punch usually develops a horizontal tendency early in his career, and goes at last from the arena to the almshouse.

Sharkey, of course, has not done much fighting lately, and was off in his timing and judgment of distance in his one start of the indoor season. But the Bostonian has the kind of right uppercut needed to cut down a lumbering right-hand swinger like Christner, and will have plenty of chances to use it.

If Christner is not knocked out it will be because Sharkey is still badly in need of practice. It will look bad for the Bostonian's chances against Stribling if he cannot land effectively upon a mark as large and stationary as this Akron heavyweight.

### Dundee to Fight Fields or Thompson

NEW YORK, Jan. 24. (EP)—Joe Dundee, welterweight champion, will defend his title against either Jackie Fields or young Jack Thompson here February 22. Max Waxman, his manager, informed Tom McCardie, Madison Square Garden matchmaker, today. Waxman promised McCardie that Dundee would sign the contract today.

Fields is considered to have first call for the title bout despite the fact that Thompson scored a knockout victory over the champion at catch-weights last November.

### Swedish Runner Will Make Debut

NEW YORK, Jan. 24. (UP)—Edvin Wide, Swedish distance runner, will make his first start in the United States at the Masonic games here next Saturday night. He signed an entry blank late today for the meet, which will be held at the 102nd Regiment Armory. A special field of high-class distance men is being arranged to oppose him.

### Lindy to Take 'Good-Will Tour'

DETROIT, Jan. 24. (UP)—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh will start a 3,500 mile flight to South America within the next month. Starting a trail down the west coast to Cape Horn and returning along the east coast, Capt. Lindbergh, American "war ace," told the Michigan automotive trades association today.

The trip, Lindbergh intimated, would be sponsored by the government as a sequel to President-elect Hoover's good will tour.

### Kentucky Derby Promises To Be No 'One Horse' Affair

CHICAGO, Jan. 24. (UP)—As closing time for entries nears, the 1929 Kentucky Derby promises some stiff competition in contrast to the "one-horse" affair of last year.

Instead of a Reigh Count to dominate the race, it appears this year will see at least a dozen horses capable of giving a good account of themselves on May 15.

Reigh Count went to the post a pronounced favorite last year and the race was little more than a one-horse affair once the Horz colt got under way. Mabeep and Toro crowded him slightly until the Count hit the stretch, where he handily proved he was the best.

The opposite is true this year and not since 1925, when Flying Ebony won, has the race drawn such a galaxy of standouts.

It begins to look as if High Strung, leading money winning 3-year-old, will be the race's favorite in this year's renewal.

Other good horses expected to compete are Roguish Eye, Karl Eitel, Jack High, Blue Larkspur, Henly, Justinian, Clyde Van Dusen, Chestnut Oak, Soul of Honor, Zoom, Twink, Current, Dr. Freeland, Double Heart and Neddie.

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The Florida was listing 25 degrees to starboard.

The compass and navigating instruments were out of order and hence it was impossible to broadcast the position of the ship.

Florida Nearly Sunk

Shortly after last prayers had been said by the crew at 5 p.m., and after all hope had been abandoned, the America was sighted.

Manning and his men reached the vessel at 7:45 p.m. and threw a line from the lifeboat. By this time the Florida was almost entirely submerged on the starboard side.

After 15 members of the crew had slid down the rope to the lifeboat, the rope broke, necessitating the installing of a new rope for the remaining men on board.

Captain Giuseppe Favalaro and Engineer Pasquale Macelo were the last to leave the sinking ship.

Rescue Men in Hour

The sale increased in velocity and Manning had to battle to keep the lifeboat from overturning. Exactly one hour after leaving the stricken ship with the rescued crew, Captain Fried, of the America, by brilliant maneuvering, brought his liner around and picked up the lifeboat and 11 men.

The passengers collected a purse of \$1,000 for the crew of the America's lifeboat, and Manning generously directed his share be divided by his crew of eight men.

Out of Food, Water

Six of the rescued men suffered minor injuries and exposure; four were seriously ill. The crew of the lifeboat was in fine shape, but exhausted.

The lifeboat was cut adrift.

The crew of the Florida had not had water nor food for three days. All food on the ship was water-soaked and the water tanks were torn open by the storm. The men were in deplorable condition when rescued and hoisted to the America by breeches buoy.
