DENVER, Colo., Jan. 24. (UP)

A cold wave whipped through North Dakota, Montana, Wyoming and Utah today, causing the mercury to dip to new low records. Tonight the storm burst into this section of Colorado. It was predicted the mercury at Denver would register between five and ten degrees below zero before daybreak.

A thermometer at a packing plant south of Butte, Mont., broke today at 55 degrees below zero. Anconda reported 44 below. Virtually all outdoor work was suspended. Miles City and Havre registered 25 below and 26 below, respectively.
