Algoma Lumber Co Wins Suit Filed By S. E. Herlihy

A decisive victory in both legal actions was scored by the Algoma Lumber company over Steven and Ellen Herlihy of Algoma, according to decision by Judge O. M. Corkins, received here yesterday.

The decisions upheld the lumber company's right to use a spring and an incline logging railroad right-of-way and denied the Herlihy's damages against the mill concern. Henry Perkins and R. C. Grossbeck represented the lumber company.

The court action was initiated by the lumber company in this form of an injunction suit seeking to restrain the Herlihy's from using the spring and otherwise obstructing the use of the incline logging railroad.

The Herlihy's retaliated by filing a damage suit against the lumber company.

By joint agreement, the two suits were combined in the same trial. An affidavit of prejudice against Judge A. L. Leavitt brought Judge O. M. Corkins to Klamath to sit in judgment over the case.

The case was tried before the Lake county judge and taken under advisement.

Wool Market Quiet Quotations Given

BOSTON, Jan. 25. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow.

"The market this week has been rather on the quiet side. There has been an increasing interest in wool on the part of the manufacturers, however, as the week has progressed, more especially in the finer wools and one or two of the large mills have already secured a sizeable nest egg in fine Texas wools against the new season, or possibly against current contracts, for the mills have still a fair volume of old business on the books.

"New prices named by the American Woolen company on staples, practically unchanged, or in a few numbers slightly lower than six months ago, should prove attractive to the buyers of cloth.

"Contracting in the west is stopped.

"Foreign markets are fairly steady, although fine wools are not quite up to the level of early December either in London or in the colonies. Cross-breeds are very firm."

Basin Boys Offered Scholarship Try

A chance at \$5,000—four years at Yale—that's the opportunity knocking at the door of some Oregon boy, perhaps a June graduate of our local high school, today.

The Oregon Yale Alumni association's scholarship committee, Robert Treat Platt, chairman, Platt building, Portland, offers to the most worthy Oregon boy, a graduate of a high school, or its equivalent, who wishes to attend the famous university at New Haven, Conn., but is otherwise unable to do so, \$500 a year for four years toward his expenses, with the expectation that, with probable tuition scholarships and the co-operation of the university bureau of self-help, he will be able to earn the rest while a student. The boy who passes the Yale college entrance board examinations, and has the best high school record in studies, extra-curriculum achievements and leadership, will be selected, regardless of whether from Portland or elsewhere.

In addition, the same boy

might win the Pacific coast (the eleven western states) scholarship of \$750 per year for four years, recently announced by the secretary of the university. For that, of course, he's got to be a mighty good man."
