

THIRD SACKERS SHORT IN EAST

Four Out of Sixteen Clubs Have Dependable Men For Position

NEW YORK, Feb. 12. (UP)—The major league manager is lucky who can say: "I do not have to worry about third base this season."

John McGraw, Bart Shotton, Louis Blackburn and Walter Johnson are the only four managers who will not have to bother about the hot corner. The other twelve managers have a third base problem on their hands.

When you've named Freddy Lindstrom of the Giants, Mike Whitney of the Phillies, Willie Kamm of the White Sox and Buddy Myer of the Senators, there are no other full-fledged star third basemen left.

Pie Traynor of the Pirates, of course, would fall in the above group, but he will be shifted to shortstop this season.

Three Youngsters Oddly enough, three of the four star third sackers are youngsters. Lindstrom, who is recognized as the best all-around third baseman in the majors, is only 25 years old.

Whitney, who broke in with the Phillies last season, is but 22. He has all the indications of developing into one of the game's greatest infielders. He played a remarkable game last season.

Myer, for whom the Senators gave five players to the Red Sox in 24. Washington already had a fine third baseman in Osabe Blazek, but the shifting of Blazek to shortstop left a gap at third base, which Myer is expected to fill.

Kamm, who led the regular third basemen of the American league in fielding last season with an average of .977, has been recognized as a star for several seasons.

Koenig to Third The Yankees will move Mark Koenig over to third and try Lyn Lary, the high-priced Oakland recruit, at shortstop. Cleveland will switch Joe Sewell, who led the American league shortstops last season with an average of .945, to third base and use Jack Teyner, obtained from Detroit in the Ohio deal, at Ray Gardner from New Orleans, at shortstop.

MacK Unneeded Connie Mack is undecided whether to use Jimmy Fox at first or third. If Fox is used at first, Jimmy Dykes or Sammy Hale will play third.

Bob Reeves, who played shortstop for the Senators last season, may be shifted to the hot corner for Boston. Jerry Standert, Memphis, and Bob Barrett, Buffalo, may be used.

Frank O'Rourke, who played 25 games at third last season, Eddie Grimes, Tulsa, and Oliver Sax, who was in 16 games last season, will battle for the Browns third base position.

Detroit Needs Thirdsacker Detroit may make some sort of shift to get a third baseman, but at present has Marty McManus and Nolen Richardson, back up again from Fort Worth.

The Cardinals will shift Frankie Frisch from second to third, and if the change doesn't work out the berth will rest between Andy High, last year's third baseman, and Fred Haney, formerly with the Tigers.

Count on Stroner The Pirates are counting on Jimmy Stroner, regarded as the best player in the Western league last season, to make good at third and justify Traynor's shift to short. Clyde Beck, who played the big last season for the

Mrs. Ramsey said that she met Weesman in a San Diego restaurant Saturday morning and again, by chance, at the Tia Juana race track that afternoon.

"We had one drink at the bar and started for the train about 4:15 p.m. Outside the grandstand I felt faint, and noticed that Weesman looked pale."

"We were bundled into a cab by this driver and I thought he would take us to the border. Instead he took us toward Agua Caliente. I was conscious, only part of the time, but I remember the driver stopping the cab and taking Weesman out. He left him on the side of the road and then drove me to the hills."

There, according to Mrs. Ramsey, she was robbed, attacked and left to wander in the hills all night. She found her way to a road Sunday morning and a motorist took her to San Diego, where she made a report today.

Thirty-eight taxicab drivers were rounded up and from them she selected Jiminez immediately.

After two days of secret investigation by authorities Mrs. Ramsey filed her public complaint today.

Hotel Man Sustains Story

Her story was corroborated by H. R. McConomy, manager of a local hotel. He said that Weesman, registered at the hotel during his stay, had come in Sunday with two front teeth missing, a swollen eye and a cut chin.

Weesman Beaten, Robbed McConomy said Weesman told of meeting "a woman from Oklahoma," and having one drink with her. Weesman said that a short time after entering the taxi-cab he was thrown out, beaten and robbed, according to the hotel man.

"Before he checked out," McConomy said, "Weesman told me that he had a call from the woman and that she said she was in trouble and needed help. I told him that from what I knew of Tia Juana and the things that went on there he had best forget the whole thing and stay away from there. He left without a word."

Suspect Plot

The Mexican authorities believe there was a plot between the taxicab driver and the bartender, who is being sought. His identity was not known. Mrs. Ramsey said to be the wife of the owner of the Tulsa Baking company, declared she would force the prosecution to the end to "make Tia Juana safe for American women."

She was understood to have communicated with her husband, who, according to word from Tulsa, plans to join her here.

Mrs. Ramsey was here alone for the winter months and planned to stay in southern California until March. She gave her age as 36.

Met in Restaurant

She met Weesman in the restaurant by chance. She asked a waitress how to get to Ventura, Calif., and when the girl replied that she did not know, Weesman, at an adjoining table, volunteered the information. She did not see him again until that afternoon at the race track.

Schaefer Wins Billiard Title

NEW YORK, Feb. 14 (Thursday) (UP)—The wizardry of a great billiard champion was re-born in his son early today as young Jake Schaefer of Chicago, worthy offspring of the old master, recaptured the world's 15.2 Balkline title he first won from Willie Hoppe.

Shortly after midnight Schaefer won the 1929 international tournament by defeating Welke Cochran of Hollywood Calif. 460 to 328 in 11 innings.

Young Jake was completely master of the situation and bit for a game spurt by Cochran in the eighth and ninth innings. Schaefer was never in danger after his run of 96 in the second inning.

Cochran, who won his last international in 1927, was erratic at times, mixing some spectacular shots with fouls that seemed almost inevitable. Jake scored six and then both had a scoreless tenth inning. In the 11th, Cochran was stopped with two, and then Schaefer ran out his string with an unfinished run of 55.

Schmeling Falls Out With Manager

NEW YORK, Feb. 13. (UP)—Max Schmeling, German heavyweight, today declared he would prefer hanging up his gloves for 18 months rather than fight under the direction of Max Bailew, German newspaperman who accompanied him to this country as his manager.

The New York state athletic commission, after investigating the managerial tangle, today moved to prevent other such situations by ruling that all existing agreements between boxers and managers, or manager and manager, must be filed with the commission.

In the statement issued today Schmeling accused Bailew of being incompetent to handle his affairs.

He concluded the statement with the threat to retire, but it is considered likely that he will make every effort to have the contract with Bailew voided on his return to Germany.
