

LOMSKI WINS 10-ROUND BOUT

Unpopular Verdict Given
Coast Man Over Tuffy
Griffiths

DETROIT, Mich., Feb. 15, (UP)—Despite the crowd's belief that he had lost, Les Lomski, the Aberdeen, Wash., battler, won a ten-round decision over Tuffy Griffiths, Sioux City, Iowa, light heavyweight tonight.

The decision was based more upon any given here in the past year, and Tuffy received one of the greatest ovations of his life as he walked from the ring with the tears from his eyes.

It was the first time in Tuffy's life that he had managed to win an argument. The slugging, charging style of Griffiths tonight gave way in a wary, fast-stepping jabber who, despite the verdict, appeared to have won four rounds, lost two and gained a draw in two.

The hard right hands which both men own were not in evidence. Both Lomski and Griffiths appeared to know too much about the other's slugging ability to do any crowding.

Mehlhorn Not Peeved About Ryder Cup Team

NEW YORK, Feb. 15, (UP)—After all "Wild Bill" Mehlhorn isn't peeved because he was left out of the Ryder cup team which meets the English professionals at Moorstown, April 26-27.

Officially welcomed today by the Pauline Country club and Mayor Jimmy Walker on his return from his southern triumphs, Mehlhorn refused to reopen the controversy which swept the golfing world when the Ryder cup team appeared without his name.

He coolly announced that the entire matter was a closed issue with him, and that he had no criticism to make of the U.S.A. selection committee.

"I feel the committee picked the ten men it deemed the best," Mehlhorn said. "I hope they all win their matches and the United States comes back with a greater victory than ever before."

Walter Hagen, captain of the team, was exuberant by Mehlhorn for having anything to do with his failure to retain a place on the team.

"Walter Hagen is my friend," Mehlhorn said, "and had nothing to do with the selection of the team or leaving me off."

FIELDS BEATS BABY JOE GANS

Negro Barely Able to
Stand at End of
Furious Bout

MADISON SQ. GARDENS, N. Y., Feb. 15, (UP)—Winning every round, Jackie Fields, Los Angeles, welterweight, hammered out a decisive victory over Baby Joe Gans, California, boxer, in a ten-round bout here tonight before a crowd of 15,000.

Gans, who had lost all but one round during the fight, but could not deliver the finishing punch.

A fight to the jaw near the end of the third round almost upped Gans, who walked to his corner after the round, weak and groggy.

Blood streamed from the boxer's mouth and nose in the late rounds.

Furious First Round—After a furious attack in the first round, Gans was weakened by Field's sharp left hooks to the head and body, and continued

Whether Nobbs Gorman had a premonition of what was liable to happen or not is unknown, but nevertheless Larry Holman, Bend, heavyweight, who substituted at the general part of the main event in the last round fight last night when Gorman backed out, took the round in the third round of the ten round stretch.

The first two rounds were furiously fought with Gorman having the best of them. In the second round Holman substituted for Nobbs Gorman who was layed out by a hard seven rounds win by Darryl Kayoes, of British Columbia. He sized up Gorman that he would be in no condition to meet Darryl last night.

Daly, Breedlove and Rose won by a technical knockout at the opening of the last round of a six round semi-final, over Jimmy Martin, 150 pounds, of Bend.

They opened last with both men giving and taking laymakers on the chin and body. Martin took the canvas in the second round and was saved from a knockout by the ring. (It was said later that he was fouled but he did not claim a foul and keep struck.) The fight went on until the fourth when Daly was given the decision and the bout was stopped.

Daly showed improvement over his performance in former bouts since he returned to the ring after a year and a half layoff.

Breedlove Gave No—Jack Breedlove, 150 pound, Bend, took a decision at the end of the sixth round of a special over Chuck Martin, 155 pounds, Klamath Falls. Breedlove has Martin groggy in the second with a volley of lefts and rights to the face and body. In the third and fourth Martin was on the defensive, hanging onto Breedlove in a flustered mood at the time.

The fifth round was Breedlove's all the way through, there wasn't any doubt of it. Martin seemed to have played himself out in the first two rounds and did not recover. In the sixth Martin dove for the count of nine and Breedlove was given the decision.

Jerry, Shick Draw—When Billie Breedlove failed to show for his match with Red Jerry, 132 pounds of Chillicothe, Howard Shick, 135 pounds, Bend, substituted. They gave a close exhibition of boxing and fast footwork during the first two rounds. In the third Shick landed one on Jerry's chin that staggered the Chillicothe boy who managed to keep his feet. They were given a draw.

Effman Kayoes—Roy Rose, 130 pounds, piled "Smiling" Joe Effman, 135 pound Indian boy, in a heap on the canvas in the second round of a four round opener.

In the first round the boys did a lot of punching and fancy dancing. When the second started "Smiling" Indian Joe hardly had time to get his feet working before Rose landed one on his button that floored him while Ed Arthur, referee, counted ten.

A good-sized audience went away satisfied. This is the second and third which the Legion has sponsored in their hall. Joe Bokerstaff promoter is well pleased with the card and believes that he has some coming champions performing in Klamath.
