weighing 1700 pounds or less, which would take in all the old makes of Fords.

Cars weighing 1700 and not over 2000 pounds are to pay 50 cents per 100 pounds of fraction thereof.

Motor trucks under 1700 pounds would pay \$10 flat and

those of greater weight at the same schedule as the cars, provided that said tire vehicles shall pay 50 per cent additional.

Carlin Against Bill Representative Carlin was the main speaker in opposition to the bill, declaring that the legislature is not giving the people what they want in the measure, and that he considered it a backward step, as it would cut off 25 per cent of the revenues from license. He said that in two years we will meet with an impossible situation—a demand for new highways and the maintenance of the ones we have now, and with revenues only reduced.
