

ELDER OUTRUNS P. WILLIAMS

Notre Dame Track Chief
Wins 60-Yard Dash in
Six Two-Fifths

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, Feb. 18. (UP)—Percy Williams, Olympic sprint champion, bowed in defeat for the first time in his career here tonight when Jack Elder, a bolt of pure lightning from the middle west, conquered the slim Canadian in a special 60-yard dash at the New York A. C.'s annual indoor athletic carnival.

Elder's time was 6.2-5 seconds, one-fifth of a second slower than the world's record.

Williams was unable to overtake the Notre Dame track captain, who leaped into the lead at the very start and shot across the finish line a scant half yard ahead of the Canadian.

Johnny Fitzpatrick of Canada finished third, with Bob Weiss and Jimmy Quinn, both of the New York A. C., unplaced. Only five started.

Elder, world's record holder for 75 yards indoors, defeated the Canadian tonight before a crowd of 10,000.

Williams made a gallant bid in the last 20 yards of the race, but could not overtake the flying youngster.

Breaks World's Record
Quebec's Baskin, former Alabama Poly star, now running for the New York A. C., broke the world's record of 7.3-5 seconds for the 60-yard high hurdles, by running his preliminary heat in 7.2-5 seconds, but was beaten by Carl Ring, the New York A. C. Olympic hurdler, in the final.

Ring won the event in 7.3-5 seconds, with Baskin second and Sol Farth, of New York U. third.

Nurmi Easy Winner
Paavo Nurmi of Finland was an easy winner in the two-mile handicap run, competing against a field of seven other runners with handicaps ranging from 50 to 150 yards. Nurmi's time was 9 minutes, 15.2-5 seconds, slow compared to the flying Finn's world record of 8:58.1-5 made on his last visit here in 1925.

Ore Anderson of Finland, with a handicap of 50 yards, was second and Frank Bayley of the New York A. C. third. Nurmi was the only one who started from scratch.

Vaults 14 Feet
Frank Sturdy of Yale won the pole vault of 14 feet but failed in three attempts to set a new world's record at 14 feet 1-1-2 inches. Sahlin Carr, Olympic pole vault champion, holds the world's indoor record of 14 feet, 1 inch. Victor Pichard of the University of Pittsburgh, who finished fourth in the Olympic pole vault, competing from Canada, was second. Barney Herlinger of Pennsylvania was third with 13 feet.

CHANGE IN GRID RULES IS MADE

Four Important Decisions
Advanced By Board
After Session

NEW YORK, Feb. 18. (UP)—Four important changes in the football rules for the 1929 season were announced today by the football rules committee after a three-day conference at the Swanton Country club, Astoria, N. J.

The changes follow:

1.—Fumbled balls recovered by the opposing side are dead at point of recovery. This rule does not apply to forward passes, backward passes or blocked kicks.

2.—All kicks legally recovered by the kicking side may be advanced in accordance with the uniform rules. The rule now applies to free kicks and kick-offs, whereas it formerly applied only to kicks from scrimmage.

3.—No player of the offensive side who has crossed the line of scrimmage shall interfere with an opponent until the ball has been touched, except in an actual attempt to catch the ball.

4.—The try-for-point after touchdown has been moved from the three to the two yard line.

Fumble Rule Explained
The committee deemed its most important action the new rule affecting fumbled balls.

"In the past a ball which had been fumbled was free and might be picked up and advanced by either team," the committee's announcement said.

"In considering the proposal that fumbled balls should be declared dead at point of recovery, if recovered by the team on the defense, the committee took into consideration the fact that in the great majority of cases the actual fumble of the ball is the error of a single player and not the fault of the team as a whole.

Also the fact that the loss of the ball by reason of a fumble is generally considered to be the equivalent to the loss of about 10 yards, namely the distance lost by the fumble itself plus the average distance of a punt—35 yards—the opportunity for which has been lost by reason of the fumble."

Change Fumbled Pass
Although in 1928 the committee took action to further restrict the use of the so-called "screen" or "forward pass," these restrictions, the committee felt, were apparently not sufficient to entirely eliminate certain tactics which unfairly handicapped the defense.

"For the purpose of clarifying the extent to which 'screening' shall be deemed illegal, the rule was amplified to read as follows:

"If the side in possession of the ball makes a forward pass, no player of the said side who has crossed the line of scrimmage shall either before or after the pass have been made interfere with an opponent until the ball has been touched, except in an actual attempt to catch the ball."

Triangle-Throw Play
"Except on passes completed behind the line of scrimmage, such players as are ineligible shall be penalized for interference if they in any way obstruct

the right-of-way of defensive players, in case of doubt as to such interference with or obstruction of the right-of-way, the penalty shall be inflicted."
