Locate Mother of William L. Ward, Killed Recently

After two weeks of search conducted by Earl Whitlock, county coroner, the mother of William L. "Whitey" Ward, found dead from knife wounds in a cabin at Chiloquin, was finally located yesterday in Wisconsin.

Since Ward's death, on February 7, an effort has been made to locate the Klamath logger's mother, since an insurance application among his possessions indicated that his mother was still alive somewhere.

Ward was a veteran of the World War and was killed while in action. It was through information in his war record on file at Washington, D. C., that the whereabouts of his mother was finally learned. His mother's name is Mrs. Mary Wagner.

The body of the murdered man is still at the Earl Whitlock Funeral Home, where it was embalmed. Funeral arrangements are now pending word from his mother.

Ward was found in a cold, bare cabin in Chiloquin on the afternoon of February 7, several hours after his death. The cabin's interior, with the walls splattered with blood, showed a struggle. Ward's head and face contained 17 wounds.

PASS "BONE DRY" BILL.

STATEHOUSE, OLYMPIA, Wash., Feb. 21.—The house today passed Representative Ratliff's "bone dry" bill, making it a felony to manufacture or sell intoxicating liquors. The vote stood 66 to 39 for passage. The bill provides a penalty of imprisonment for not less than one year nor more than five years.

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
