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and differences among the respective counties would make the proposed classification impractical. Senator R. J. Carson, Spray, representing Gilliam, Sherman and Wheeler counties, claimed that the classification would increase the taxes in his counties approximately one mill and a half. Senator Jay Upson, Bend, announced that Senator Edward Miller, Grants Pass, was planning on introducing a salary classification bill based on wealth, population and area.

Goddard Speaks

Several county officers appeared before the committee this afternoon when the salary bill came up for discussion. Among them was County Judge Fred R. Goddard, Klamath Falls, who opposed the bill on grounds of differences in counties.

"My work in Klamath county is more than in others," Judge Goddard declared. "Last year we had 12 insanity cases and 40 juvenile cases, all of which I had to investigate. With a large floating population and big saw mills, the work is heavy. This bill would make a 30 per cent cut on some county salaries. This scale is impossible for our county."

Low Tolls Conditions

L. L. Low, sheriff of Klamath county, told the growth of his county. "In 1911 the salary of sheriff was raised to \$3,000. There were 1,500 registered voters at that time. Last year there were 11,500 voters. I have to go into every nook and corner of our large county. We have an Indian reservation in our county which increases the difficulties of my job. We are also near the California border and have the liquor laws to contend with. We need to get in Class 1 to get the right salaries, and we can never do that," Mr. Low declared.

Clark Defends Bill

Representative J. F. Clark, Oregon City, chairman of the committee that introduced the salary classification, defended the measure. He declared that a classification based on wealth, population and area would not be possible, since there is no available data on population.

"I still think that the salaries are all too low, but I don't think by raising the salaries that we will get any better men. We were finally forced to take valuation as a measure of classification," he said.
