

HEAVIES WILL MEET TONIGHT IN FLORIDA

Sharkey Favored to Win; Little Betting Done; May Upset Dope

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 26. (U.P.)—Against the picturesque backdrop of blue skies, waving palms, teeming green and azure waters of this winter playground, the two outstanding American heavyweight contenders, Jack Sharkey of Boston and Young Stribling of Georgia meet in the ring at Flamingo park tomorrow night.

For a few hours, the many-manned pleasures of Miami Beach will be forsaken by society and sporting folk in favor of the glitzy benches of the big arena, built to hold 40,000 spectators.

Nose Flattening Process.
Aristocratic ladies with turned-up noses will watch for a while the processes whereby noses are flattened. Through clouds of steam dust and small winged insects beneath the glare of 10,000 watts of electric lighting, Florida gentlemen in flannels will peer at the modern methods of modified surgery.

The hope of everyone concerned that this will turn out to be a right good fight, not one of those routine, tussling, tumbling affairs, depends in no small measure upon what kind of a fight Jack Sharkey decided to make. For Sharkey obviously can whip the other, fight Georgia boy if he makes up his mind to sail in and do so.

Sharkey Should Win.
Sharkey should win, possibly but not probably by a knockout. This is the opinion of nearly 100 per cent of the fluff critics who watched the contenders through the closing stages of their training. The solid south still sticks to its faith in Stribling, but it will take a better effort than young "William L." yet has shown to beat Jack Sharkey as the Lithuanian shapes up on the eve of battle.

Comparatively Few Bets.
Strangely enough, with Miami Beach crowded with sporting gentry from all parts of the country, big operators whose bets at Havana are staggering the bookmakers, multimillionaires who like a flutter on an affair of this kind, and all the hangers-on and some of the riff-raff of Florida, there is comparatively little betting on the fight.

Technically, the odds tonight are 6 to 5 on Sharkey, but actually, if one has any considerable amount of money to wager on Stribling, one has difficulty in finding anyone to lay the odds.

Opinion Influences Little.
Despite the fact that all the experts select Sharkey, their opinion has had little influence upon the betting. Both fighters have disappointed so often that their followers are skeptical. If it's one of those fights in which the men stand up and trade wallop, the odds might as well be tossed to the flying fish in Hicayay bay far then anything may happen.

Morgan to Defend Lightweight Title Against Santiago

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 26. (U.P.)—Tom Morgan, junior lightweight champion, today signed a contract with the Olympic Auditorium to defend his title against Santiago Zorilla, Panama contender, on the night of April 2.

Morgan will receive a guarantee of \$15,000, to be deposited with the state athletic commission a week before the bout takes place. Both boxers will post weight and appearance forfeits of \$2,000. They will weigh in at 130 pounds the day of the fight.

Zorilla will receive about 10 per cent after Morgan's guarantee is deducted from the net gate receipts. Jack Doyle, promoter, said he believed the fight would draw \$25,000 at a \$2 to \$5 scale.

T. CANZONERI ADVANCES STEP

Defeats Fernandez After Ten-Round Slugfest, On Points

CHICAGO, Feb. 26. (U.P.)—Tony Canzoneri, New York, advanced a step further in his quest to regain the featherweight championship by winning a ten-round decision from Ignacio Fernandez, Filipino, here tonight.

Both fighters were slugging at the final bell, but Canzoneri had piled up a point margin which gave him the victory.

Fernandez began strongly and was out in front during the first three rounds, but Tony started a spurt in the fourth round and carried the next two frames. He culminated this assault in the fifth round with a series of rights and lefts to the Filipino's head which slowed Fernandez preceptibly.

Ignacio took on new life at the start of the eighth round and won the round by out-slugging Canzoneri. In this round the two fighters stood toe to toe for the entire two minutes, with all four fists flying, but neither was able to send the other down, although both seemed groggy at the round ended.

Fernandez was strong again in the ninth and still had steam enough behind his punches to keep Tony from wading in. Canzoneri easily won the tenth round, but Fernandez was willing to slug and they were standing toe to toe swinging as the final bell sounded.

Little announced Tuesday that Mrs. Slaff and "Madame X" would be sought for testimony at the impeachment trial.

Rumors that Mrs. McPherson had been in a "love cottage" at Carmel-by-the-Sea between the time she dropped out of sight at Ocean Park and reappeared at Douglas, Ariz., were declared false by Mrs. Slaff.

Residents Subpoenaed.
However, residents of Carmel-by-the-Sea had been subpoenaed to appear before the grand jury, when the investigation was suddenly dropped.

Officials of Los Angeles county were puzzled by several parts of Mrs. Slaff's stories and never made a direct statement that Mrs. Kinball was "Madame X."

Comment on present gasoline war now waging in California; "we need more payrolls," says San Franciscan.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 26. (U.P.)—What is behind the war on gasoline on the coast this is selling for nine cents a gallon in San Francisco today and it looks like a further cut is coming. One old fellow who is slow to anger, but who watches things with great interest, said, "There are too many gas stations up and down the coast and this is the only way to kill off a bunch of them."

He may be right, but it is rather hard on the fellow who, with good faith, puts his money in a filling station and then finds a war on that, only the well-financed concern can stand against.

It will be remembered that last last spring California editors under the leadership and guidance of that dean of the profession—Gov. Friend W. Richardson—accepted the hospitality of Bick Field at Grater Lake and there held their annual session. This year the same crowd is going into Old Mexico and again Governor Richardson heads the party for he is a sort of God-father to every newspaperman in California.

Is the public in a big city becoming dense, or are newspapers reaching that low ebb which prompts them to jump at anything sensational in an attempt to inflame the public mind and sell more papers?

This question presented itself to me when, on the Washington holiday, the different daily papers here came out with screaming headlines: "Baby Doria is lost;" and then the stories intimated that a little child had been spirited away, that some secret organization was holding her in bondage, that terrible results might follow, and a lot more blood-curdling intimations.

Each edition followed the other with tales of the search. On the streets the burning question was, "Have they found Doria?"

In talking to an old-timer in San Francisco today he said, "Our problem is taxes and we need more payrolls." How familiar that sounds. In Oregon we have heard something of a similar nature, yet here in this magnificent city where seemingly all the wealth of the coast assembles, the people need lower taxes and more payrolls. It seems to be a national affliction, this tax problem. But it has been a world affliction since the day when the parents of Our Saviour trudged down to the tax collector's office. Like Mark Twain's poor relation, the problem apparently will always be with us.

LEGION SETS DATE FOR CARD

On March 6 Fighters Will Assemble to Maul Each Other

Determined to stage a fight card which would more than make up for the failure of the last main event, the American Legion and boxing commission last night announced the line-up of what appeared to be one of the best balanced cards ever undertaken in Klamath Falls. It will be held March 6, in the Legion memorial hall.

Three boys with reputations as long as your arm, have been imported from Seattle, two from Aberdeen, two from Spokane and one from San Francisco. The fact that the fight game is not thriving particularly in Washington, at this time has given Klamath the big chance to get good fighters at a reasonable price.

Klamath fans at the last fight card showed that they were willing to support fights as long as they were conducted on the square, said Walter Waggoner, member of the boxing commission, and an ardent booster of the gentle art of give and take. "We had a tough break when Nails Gorman ran out of the main event at the last minute, but, at that, we put on a pretty good card, considering the circumstances."

However, not one fan asked for his money back when informed of the situation before the card started. Now we're going to try and do our part by staging some real bang-up fights for the boys."

The fight card is as follows:
Joe "Spark Plug" Bond, the Aberdeen terror, vs. Orville Barr, Spokane, ten round main event, light heavyweights.

Bob James, a good tough boy from Aberdeen, vs. Jack Broadlove of Bend, six round semi-wind-up, weight 152 pounds.

Steamboat "Jackson," Spokane, who has met such boys as Ollie Newham, Johnnie Walker and Buzzsaw Burnell (the defeated Barnell), will meet the well-known Ray Hoffman, in a four-round special event, weight 156 pounds.

Eddie Morris, San Francisco welterweight, who has met the sensational pugilist, Jack Thompson, will meet Joe Slaff, who has met Sammy Mandell, and bears a good reputation.

Finally, the tough Roy Rose, who has yet to lose a fight in a Klamath ring, will tangle with a clever youngster from Seattle by the name of Pete Magallanes. They will weight 125 pounds.

Without going into details about the respective records of each fighter, it does look as if it would be a great card. As usual, it will be sponsored by the American Legion.

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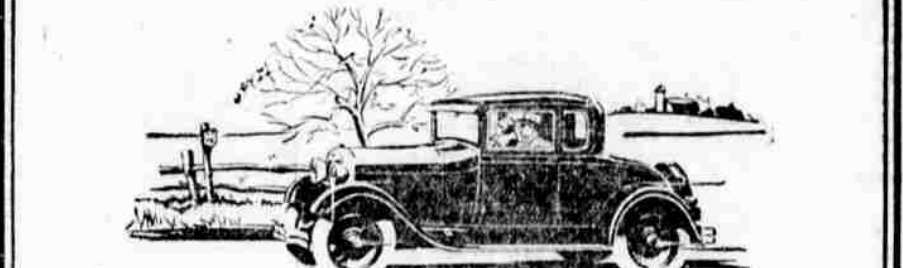
