ing the gang leader to appear before a grand jury here March 12 to tell what he knows about the operations of beer runners and their wars.

McGurn was taken to the office of Deputy Commissioner of Police John Stege. Two assistant state's attorneys and Stege were closeted with McGurn during the questioning. A girl was said to have been arrested with McGurn but authorities at the detective bureau would not reveal where she had been taken.

The developments in the massacre investigation followed the finding early today of a wrecked automobile resembling the car used in the Moran gang murders. The car had been shattered by dynamite in an isolated Chicago suburban section, leading investigators to believe the bombing was a ruse to sidetrack and confuse the police.

Lindy, Anne Crash In Plane Upset

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The crash was Lindbergh's first serious mishap since his flight from New York to Paris, and only his marvelous skill in handling the plane appeared to have saved the affianced couple from grave injury.

Lindbergh's shoulder was reset at the Lady Cowdry hospital, where he was taken after an unsuccessful attempt to administer anesthetic had been made at the embassy. The anesthetic was given the flier at the hospital while he had the shoulder reset.

Later he returned to the embassy and was able to sit up and talk over the mishap with his fiancée and her family. They were all disposed to discuss the accident in a joking manner.

Lindbergh returned to Valbuena field to inspect his plane at 6:20 p. m.

Plane Upsets Only Lindbergh's skill in handling the plane, which had lost its right wheel in leaving a nearby landing field, appeared to have saved the affianced couple from greater injury when the craft tumbled over after racing along for about 50 yards on the flying field.

Spectators, who had witnessed the take-off from Valbuena field, rushed to the side of the damaged plane—an awful moment when it was feared both occupants might not have escaped so lightly.

"Nothing to Say"

"I have nothing to say," Lindbergh told reporters as he attempted to compose himself after being assured his fiancée was not injured. He added, however, that the right wheel was lost when they landed at an adjacent field between the time they left Valbuena field and the time of their return from a pleasure flight of about three hours.

"Augustus will speak for me," said Miss Morrow, looking anxiously at Lindbergh, and using the colonel's middle name.

"Mishap," Not Accident Lindbergh insisted that the crash was not an accident but merely a "mishap." The machine was running at a slow speed when

Need Cooperation To Put Over Convention
