OLYMPIC STAR
HITS AT A. A. U.
M'LARNIN WINS
BY KNOCKOUT

Criticizes Officials For Hasty Action After Suspension
Joe Glick Unable to Rise After 1 Minute, 37 Seconds in 2nd

NEW YORK, March 1. (UP)—Ray Barbati, the man who can hit his heart out to win the only flat race the United States won at Amsterdam, in a letter to the United Press today replied to the A. A. U.'s suspension of him as a result of statements attributed to him in a New York newspaper. The Olympic 400-metre champion said that he did not fear the suspension placed on him, but he was replying only because he had been taught to always follow the principles of good sportsmanship. In a letter addressed to John J. Deligan, chairman of the registration committee of the metropolitan association of the A. A. U., Barbati stated that he did not say: "I'm through with that gang of footbalers forever," and "I and other athletes have been hit by the pockets of the A. A. U. and its affiliated clubs for years." These two statements and others were attributed to Barbati in a New York newspaper, and it was on the strength of them that the metropolitan body suspended him "until such time as you prove or retract these statements." Barbati said he resented the fact that the A. A. U. suspended him without taking the trouble to inquire whether the statements attributed to him were true. "If some of the A. A. U. crowd could have come to the trouble to pick up a telephone and ask me if the stuff attributed to me were true, his letter said, 'I could have answered in three minutes and I don't think there would have been any suspension nor all this unfavorable publicity.' "But instead of a simple telephone call one of the A. A. U. crowd, who was a pretty much of a hero on the Olympic trip, wants to be a big shot, and have a lot of us fellows jump at his beck and call—I don't intend to do it."

Pirates, Minus Waners, Practice

PASO ROBLES, Calif., March 1. (UP)—For the first time this spring, the entire squad of Pittsburgh Pirates, with the exception of Paul and Lloyd Waner, holdouts, went through brisk morning and afternoon practice sessions here today. A burning sun beamed down on the athletes, enabling them to do their best work of the year so far. "Battling featured both workouts, the rookies clabbing in the gymnasium and the regulars taking their turn after lunch. Burleigh Grimes and Steve Sweeton, pitchers who had suffered from colds recently, made their first appearance on the practice field in several days."

Roberts, Meyers Draw, 10 Rounds

SAN FRANCISCO, March 1. (UP)—Eddie "K. O." Roberts of Tacoma held Pete Meyers, local welterweight, in a draw after 10 fast rounds here tonight. A majority of the fans seemed to think the decision was a fair one. Meyers had been a favorite to virtue of his knockout victory over Sergeant Sammy Baker of New York several weeks ago.

NEW YORK, March 1. (UP)—Jimmy McLarnin, overgrown Vancouver, B. C., lightweight, knocked out Joe Glick of Brooklyn, one of the leading lightweight contenders, after 1 minute 37 seconds of fighting in the second round of a scheduled ten-round bout before a crowd of 15,000 here tonight. McLarnin floored Glick twice before the Brooklyn boy was counted out by Referee Arthur Donovan. A right hook dropped Glick for a count of five early in the second round. A second later a series of hooks to the head sent Glick down again for a count of seven. Coming back up, Glick, bloodied from the nose and mouth, fought back furiously at McLarnin, but the baby-faced Irish boy backed away and waited for an opening. Once again McLarnin lashed out his left hook and caught Glick flush on the chin. Glick dropped heavily to the floor, rolled over on his stomach, head down. At the count of seven Glick rolled over and made an attempt to rise. He reached his hands and knees at the count of ten, but was unable to arise completely as he collapsed in Referee Donovan's arms. McLarnin, who had twice won decisions from Glick, entered the ring weighing 140 1/2 pounds, three-fourths of a pound more than the weight at which the match was made. As a result Harry Alberts, manager of Glick, claimed McLarnin's weight forfeit. Glick weighed 136 1/2.

Intercollegiate Track Meet

NEW YORK, March 1. (UP)—With eight champions defending their titles in 11 championships events, the annual Intercollegiate Amateur Athletic Association of America meet Saturday night promises to be one of the best indoor tournaments the organization has held. Twenty-seven colleges and universities of the east have entered a total of more than 400 picked athletes and competition to every event promises to be keen.
