

WILL CARD'S BOSS TRIUMPH?

Southworth Is Too Easy Going Some Say; Breardon Is Satisfied

NEW YORK, March 2. (UP)—Billy Southworth, 166 sayings to manage the hard-boiled National League champions, the St. Louis Cardinals.

This question is going the rounds in baseball circles as the major league teams prepare for the opening of the season April 16.

Back in 1924 and 1925 when Southworth was breaking his heart trying to convince John J. McGraw of his worth as a player, Southworth was known as the "nifty" man on the club. Around the league he was regarded as one of the friendly men in baseball.

Now Billy's friends—and he has few enemies—think he will not be able to control the Cardinals and soon will go the way of Rogers Hornsby, Bob O'Farrell and Bill McKechnie.

But Sam Breardon, Billy's boss, shrewd, keen and successful in business and baseball, has faith in his choice for leader of the National League champions.

"I know Southworth better than a lot of people," Breardon said while in New York for the league schedule meeting. "I think he will be a successful leader. He has plenty of character and firmness for the job, for all that he is a nice fellow."

Southworth, failed with the Giants because he tried too hard. Now he is facing a more important test than when he roamed the outfield at the Polo grounds, and the temptation to try too hard again may enslave him and ruin his managerial career.

Pladner Kayoes Genero for Title

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CALIFORNIA WINS TITLE

Huskies Defeated 30-27 in Second Game of Coast Playoff

SEATTLE, March 2. (UP)—The Pacific coast conference basketball championship went south tonight when the University of California Bears defeated the Washington Huskies, 30 to 27, in the second game of the coast playoff.

The game was featured by a sensational attempted comeback on the part of the Husky five in the last half that brought the spectators to their feet in the last few minutes of play.

Handicapped by a score of 21 to 4 at the beginning of the second half, the Huskies fought their way to a point that looked dangerous for the Bear victory.

The first half was all California, and it seemed a very bewildered Husky five that faced the brilliant play of the Bear quintet.

The whistle for the half sounded upon a very puzzled Husky team that was standing at the small end of a 21 to 6 score.

In an effort to check the California victory, Coach Edmondson shifted his lineup for the second half.
