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S. P. LAYS NEW STEEL ON LINE

Within the next three months the Southern Pacific company will have completed its roadbed ballasting program in Oregon, a project that has been under way for five years, according to E. L. King, superintendent of the Portland division.

More than \$200,000 has been spent to date in the operation, which has been carried on as consistently as weather would permit, said Mr. King. The roadbed from Portland to Ashland, on the old main-line route, and from Portland to Crescent lake on the Cascade route, will, upon completion of the work, be brought to the highest point of perfection in Southern Pacific history, he said.

From Portland to Eugene, crushed basalt to a depth of eight inches has been placed in position. From Eugene south to Ashland, crushed boulders have been used to a depth of six inches. In addition, other work of improving the roadbed has progressed as ballasting was carried forward.

All 90-pound rails are being replaced on curves in the Southern Pacific main line, continues Mr. King. On the old main line, 110-pound steel is going in to its place. On the new Cascade route 120-pound steel is being laid. Eventually, according to the division superintendent, the entire Cascade route will be laid with 120-pound steel.

Klamath Men Arrested in Jackson County

ASHLAND, Ore., March 5.—J. Fereno of San Francisco and J. L. Sangrinette of Pelican City were each sentenced to serve 60 days in the county jail and each fined \$500 when they pleaded guilty to charges of transportation of liquor. They appeared before Justice of the Peace Glen O. Taylor of Medford.

Two alleged professional rum-runners were apprehended, two cargoes of contraband liquor, totaling 108 gallons, and two cars, a new Ford coupe ran only 1700 miles and a new Hudson sedan ran less than 10,000 miles were confiscated by officers late Friday afternoon.

The Hudson sedan driven by J. Sangrinette of Pelican City, accompanied by his 18-year-old daughter, contained 47 gallons of Dago Red wine, three ten-gallon kegs, three five-gallon kegs and two one-gallon jugs. Mrs. Sangrinette, according to the story told by the young girl, did not like the moonshine produce in the vicinity of Pelican City so had sent her husband to California to get some wine. Sangrinette is an Italian. A son, Angelo Sangrinette, arrested two years ago by federal officers, paid a fine in a local court on a similar charge.

While officers were questioning Sangrinette, a Ford coupe, driven by J. Fereno, Spaniard from San Francisco, came along with keys showing in the rear end of his car. Officers investigated and found he had a cargo of 60 gallons of alleged moonshine and one gallon of wine.
