

DARR RECEIVES NOD OVER BOYD

Fans Donate to Huffman in Hospital; Curtain Raiser Good

Orylle Darr, hard hitting light-heavyweight, pounded his way to a victory over "Spark Plug" Boyd in a ten-round battle at Legion hall last night and turned in his most decisive win of the present season in a Klamath ring.

Boyd came out in the first round and made Darr look like a last year's freight train trying to go over a mountain, but Boyd couldn't hold up. After about three rounds he lost his wind, as other Seattle fighters who jumped from the coast line to the higher altitude.

Boyd Good Catcher
Boyd was a wonderful catcher. Darr would toss one over and if it went anywhere near the plate Boyd was there to receive. Too many times Darr missed and nearly fell down, to be in the best form, but when he landed he landed hard and Boyd, laughing and grinning, would come back for more.

Boyd landed some good blows and when they landed they staggered Darr.

There was no doubt about it being Darr's fight. With the exception of the first round he completely outclassed Boyd. Darr weighed 180; Boyd 170.

Huffman in Hospital
Jack Breedlove took Bob James, Seattle, in the fourth round of the semi-windup on a technical knockout, and showed his right to the position which he held on the card.

Breedlove far outclassed James, who was bleeding badly from mouth and nose. He was practically out when the bout was stopped.

Ray Huffman, Seattle, who got in from the northern city only to be taken to the hospital with a case of pneumonia the night he arrived failed to be in condition for the fight. When fans learned that he was in the hospital and that he was practically "broke" and came here to fight on percentage because he needed money, nearly \$70 was tossed into the ring by the men who were as good sports as Huffman. Huffman's manager was pleased. "I've never seen anything like it in a city of this size before," he said.

Harrington Fouled
Wilbur Harrington took Huffman's place on the card and won on a foul, after being beaten by "Steamboat" Jackson. Jackson had advantage of weight and several inches in reach over the game little Indian boy from Chilquien, and fouled Harrington three times with low punches before the bout was stopped.

Then "Steamboat" stayed in the ring and howled mighty blasts that did not prove popular with Klamath fans.

Selloff, Morris Draw
Joe Selloff and Eddie Morris battled a four-round draw in a preliminary. Morris was favored by the crowd. Both boys mixed hits in a fast manner, and it was a good bout.

Rose Rose resigned early in the game with his scheduled fight with Pete Magallanese, Filipino. Billie Breedlove was then signed but evidently Billie had a premonition, for he too, failed to show.

Wright Fights Filipino
It was then that Harold Wright, Klamath Indian from Chilquien, who fears nothing, stepped into the breach. It was the curtain-raiser, but it was one of the best fights of the evening. The Filipino boy is a double main eventer or a semi-windup in Seattle.

For four fast rounds Wright and the Filipino battled. Every

INDICT THOMAS FOR BLUE SKY

Publisher Charged With Falsification of Records

Four of the five secret indictments returned by the Klamath county grand jury Tuesday became known yesterday. Three are against A. M. Thomas, secretary of the Klamath Irrigation district, and editor of the Malin Progress, and one against Riley Loomis, who is serving a jail sentence in Susanville, Cal., according to word received here yesterday.

Loomis was indicted on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses. After he finishes serving the Susanville sentence he was convicted there on the same charge. It is reported he will be brought to Klamath.

Thomas, formerly a resident of Malin, now residing in Klamath Falls, is charged with two violations of the "Blue Sky" law and, in a third indictment, he is alleged to have falsified the records of a corporation, namely the Malin Progress.

Witnesses who testified before the grand jury included Dick Lacey, Charles Wood, Eberlein, John Robert, Dick Walsh, Dennis O'Connor, Martin Green, Charles E. Warren, Jerry O'Connor, W. E. O'Brien, A. L. Andrews and E. W. Kienich.

The indictment alleging falsification of records stated that Thomas altered the minutes of a board of directors meeting of the Malin Progress by inserting the following paragraph:

"It was regularly moved and seconded that the compensation of A. M. Thomas should be at the rate of fifty dollars (\$50.00) per month for the period November 19, 1925 to February 4, 1926, and at the rate of \$200 per month from February 5, 1926 as long as he should continue with the company or until such later time as his salary should be raised or lowered by appropriate action and that the sum due him hereunder should be a valid claim against the company. This motion was put to vote, carried and so announced."

Indictments based on the alleged violations of the "Blue Sky" law charged that Thomas had been "engaging in the sale of securities of an Oregon private corporation without first having complied with the requirements of chapter two, of title of Oregon laws."

County's 1929 Taxation Status Told In Report
An insight into how taxes and assessed valuations have kept pace with the growth of the Klamath country was revealed yesterday by a review of the Klamath 1929 tax situation compiled by Glen Terrell, assistant county assessor.

In the first place, there has been a marked gain in total assessed valuation—\$4,779,856 to be exact. Total valuation of Klamath county today is \$39,455,342.24.

Comparatively speaking, the public utilities showed the largest percentage of gain, \$2,114,554. Total valuation of utilities this year is \$19,847,772.26. Incidentally, the total tax which will be paid by public utilities will be \$376,970.92, or \$56,595.92 more than last year.

Valuation placed on the Southern Pacific railroad company in Klamath is \$1,809,627; on the California-Oregon Power company, \$1,662,570.38; on the Great Northern Railroad company, \$225,728.50; on the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, \$121,539.50; on the Oregon, California and Eastern Railroad company, \$396,698.25; on the Pullman company, \$105,989.76. Other utilities of lesser importance serve to make up the total valuation of \$19,847,772.26.

Another noted increase in taxation was noted in the school districts where the total school tax—bond redemption included—is placed this year at \$254,706.81, or an increase over last year of \$48,474.27.

Valuation of Klamath municipalities materially increased as also did total taxes. Mr. Terrell's figures show that the total tax of Klamath Falls, Chilquien, Bonanza, Merrill and Malin this year is \$629,500.06 or \$115,442.36 greater than last year.

County's 1929 Taxation Status Told In Report

The review shows that there were 1,353,297 acres of land taxed whose total valuation was placed at \$16,689,125. Valuation on logging roads was placed at \$263,209; on steamboats, sailboats and manufacturing machinery, \$762,590.

There are 1704 horses and mules in Klamath and 15,795 head of cattle. Number of sheep total 63,507; of swine, 909; of dogs, 156; and of foxes, 87.
