KLAMATH PROPERTY

Main street property in Klamath Falls sold yesterday for approximately \$1,200 a front foot. In making the purchase it was brought out that when the former owner purchased the property he was congratulated for making the first purchase of Klamath Falls Main street ground on the front footage basis.

In a comparatively few years property that was sold by the block or by the acre is sold for \$1200 a front foot. What better investment could be made in property than in Klamath Falls where values are steadily increasing and where no unhealthy land boom conditions exist?

Each day new business houses are opening. Each day finds the announcement of the construction of a new building. Many beautiful new dwellings are being built on streets that are improved or soon will be.

Men who have lived in Klamath many years are investing their money in property here because they realize that it is a safe investment and that property values will not decrease.

It is a healthy growing condition that reflects upon all who live in the Klamath Basin.

RAISE SOME ONIONS

Klamath farmers are learning of onion growing. Last year several carloads of dry onions were marketed by growers in the Basin. They received good prices, some made as high as \$500 an acre on that one crop alone.

Raising onions seems like a small industry, but added to others it brings income to the producer. Farmers now believe in not having all their eggs in one basket. Potatoes, onions, clover for seed purposes, livestock, grain, poultry, all bring money into Klamath county and the farmer who does not depend on one crop alone will prosper.

It has been proved that the growing of onions in this climate is profitable as it has of potatoes, clover, cattle, sheep, poultry and various grains. It is not a

Machines vs. Words
As the Twig Is Bent
Measuring Star Heat*

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HERBERT HOOVER, your new president, promising to obey the constitution, kissed the Bible with his thumb on this verse in proverbs:

"Where there is no vision the people perish, but he that keeps the law happy is he."

Vision, ability to look ahead, see what is needed and do it. Keeping the law, even if you don't happen to like it, that is a good program.

In his earnest inaugural address President Hoover said: "We are building a new race—a new civilization great in its own achievements."

How much will Herbert Hoover as president, add to the country's accomplishments, power and prosperity?

He has the right training. That he will give the people that have elected him, everything he can give, is certain.

MANY will welcome this line from the address: "Peace can be contributed to by respect for our ability in DEFENSE."

HERBERT HOOVER is an engineer, and knows that work is done by machinery, not by words, loud or soft. He knows that to make this country safe machines are needed in the air, under the water and on the water. And it is safe to predict that he will insist on having them.

county were passed, as well as the cattle rustler's bill, which is important at this time in view of the fact there has been much stock stealing in the county the past year. The new law provides that all stock sold to the market must be tagged with an ownership tag. It is believed this will save stockmen in the county between \$25,000 and \$40,000 a year.

A bill which proposed a special levy for Klamath county fair purposes was also passed at this session, which will mean a great deal towards raising funds for the Klamath county fair, the representative stated.

SIXTH FROM STATE

About \$1300 will be returned to Klamath county through an appropriation bill which Collier, who was on the ways and means committee, was instrumental in having passed, and which pays the county money due on expenses for prisoners taken to Salem during the years 1923, '26, '27 and '28. Sheriff L. L. Low and Judge Fred R. Goddard were at the legislature at the time this bill was introduced.

Successful Session

No bills were passed which effected changes in salaries of county officials, it was learned from Collier, who said:

"The salary bill which was introduced was not for the purpose of cutting, but to equalize salaries throughout the state. It was misunderstood by many. The bill really provided that there should be no increase in salaries until assessed valuation of a county placed it in the first class. However, the bill was finally killed."

Collier stated that he felt it had been a very successful session in regard to work accomplished, not only for the benefit of the county, but for the state as a whole.
