

# DEMPSEY WILL BE PROMOTER

Considers Offers From Garden and Fugazy; Detroit Next

NEW YORK, March 7. (UP)—Jack Dempsey, champion boxer, today announced that he had accepted the offer of a promoter, arrived in New York today to consider of one which may have an important bearing on his future in the ring.

That the former champion is satisfied with the financial results of the Miami Beach fight is evident, but Dempsey is not sure of just what he may do in the future.

## Has Two Offers

Officials of Madison Square Garden, who backed Dempsey at Miami Beach, are expected to approach him with an offer which may result in his permanent connection with the garden. Then, however, Dempsey, New York promoter, has indicated he will make Dempsey an interesting offer.

Fugazy has been planning to meet a large sports arena here and is said to be dickering for one of the ball parks for outdoor fights. The name of Dempsey should prove a valuable asset in these projects.

## To Be Promoter

Dempsey is not relying entirely upon the possibility of making lucrative connections in this city, however. He has determined to be a promoter regardless of the odds and declared he would see himself up in the game if unable to locate in New York.

Detroit will be the first town considered by the former champion, he said, and he plans to leave New York late next week to scout the field there.

## Has "Spots" in Mind

"I am not interested only in Detroit," he said. "If I find the prospect there unpromising I have one or two other spots in mind where I can turn." "Where these 'spots' are, Dempsey very delicately said, but he spoke favorably of the fight interest in California and recalled that the boxing laws there were favorable to the promoter.

# Dartmouth Coach Resigns Position

HANOVER, N. H., March 7. (UP)—Jesse H. Hawley, for four years head football coach of Dartmouth college, and one of the best known members of the game, has tendered his resignation because of pressure of business duties.

Hawley will be succeeded by Jackson Cannon of Everett, Mass., former head coach, and for the past four weeks chief scout for the big green.

Under Hawley's guidance, the Dartmouth gridsters have had the most successful seasons in the history of football at Dartmouth. The Hawley system became one of the most famous in the country, developing in 1925 an undefeated eleven.

# Boxing Bill Is Now State Law

SALEM, Ore., March 7. (UP)—Governor Patterson today affixed his signature to the boxing bill, which provides that 60 per cent of the net proceeds of any boxing or wrestling bout are to be distributed among nationally recognized organizations of war veterans.

The bill prohibits the staging of boxing or wrestling bouts on Decoration Day, Armistice Day or Sundays.

The Upton bill, providing for the organization of rural fire protection districts, was also signed by the governor.

# Just Ramblin' Around

One year makes remarkable difference in appearance of Los Angeles; boom on real estate under way in Phoenix.

## LOS ANGELES, March 7.

A year makes a difference in this country. It has been a year since I was here and the difference is showing remarkable changes. Buildings are being erected in every direction and in some cases where one year ago there was nothing but open spaces—much resembling a vast, now homes and business sections are thickly settled.

No matter what one may think of Los Angeles she is the fastest growing city in the country. And this does not mean the close-in zone—the business zone as one applies it to most cities. For Los Angeles is showing the world that retail business must be decentralized and scattered over the entire city.

It is almost certain proof that people who have held what they called "closed-in" business property for years and rested in the belief that their fortunes were assured now face the unexpected and find that their values are decreasing rather than increasing and that new centers throughout the city are springing up.

THE large stores have bought locations fifty blocks out of the old center and they are arranging to secure business centers seventy blocks out from their first and former stand. All of this means "things are not like they were when father was a boy." Women may change her style; men may wear whiskers or not, and according to the old way of thinking these were but eccentricities of humanity; but no one, until lately, ever thought the business center of a city could change. Such is the case and the high priced frontage of early days when it was thought necessary that business be done in a certain zone, is gone forever.

OVER in Phoenix there is a boom on and real estate is the main part of the city along the "main drag" is selling for a "thousand dollars a front foot," much to the surprise of the old timers. Here in Los Angeles frontage is jumping when a big store decides that it is time to secure another location.

Many people here look for the home banks to be about all that are left in what was once the inside business zone of the city; that retailing will be done in a half dozen outside centers. Banks are hastening to grab locations on the outside also, so the property owner is up against a dilemma.

WHEN I see Sunset boulevard in Hollywood I always think of the versatile and far-seeing Bob Coyne who is well known in Klamath Falls.

Bob went into the Hollywood hills when they looked very similar to the hills east of our city toward the old Fort Klamath road. He bought heavily and created the first good home. Rattlesnakes and tarantulas crawled in his basement, but he had visions that some day Sunset boulevard would be the choice residence district of Los Angeles.

Look at it today and you will agree that his judgment was good. Many of the moving picture people have their homes there, and many of them were built by Coyne who sold them the land and erected their homes.

A year ago when I was here there was a little fruit stand on Sunset boulevard near King's Road. Today I find the Moscow Inn—a typical Russian building—has displaced the little fellow who peddled the organ and banana.

When the lights of the city come on the Russian Inn takes on life. An orchestra composed of nine Russians furnish music and when the car stops Col. A. P. Dobrynina, in full military regalia, opens the door and assists the guests to the Inn. The Colonel is genuine, as are all of the Russians who handle the Moscow Inn. He was in the Czar's army and was trusted to the extent that he delivered sixty million rubles to the White Russian troops during the World war—money that had been sent to Russia by the allies.

General Savitsky, one of the late Czar's personal military officials, handles the interior of the cafe and acts as host of the evening. He overlooks nothing and he spares no effort to give every customer that remarkable attention which the old world bestows on its guests. Large and broad shouldered, the General's appearance at once inspires confidence in him.

With Russian singers and dancers the program goes merrily on but it is all under direction of that masterful young man, Prince B. Grifit-Dolgorsky, former official of the Imperial Guard, whose name and line runs many centuries beyond the Czar's family, the Romanoffs.

connection between the two proposals.

## Sees Mutual Benefit

Judge Gilman believes that the proposed extension of the Great Northern south from here to connect with the Western Pacific proposed extension will be of mutual benefit to both California and the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana on the north.

"You see," Judge Gilman proceeded to explain, "the northern tier of states served by the Great Northern is naturally a great market for the fruit crops and other agricultural products grown in California. Likewise the products grown and manufactured in the northern tier of states are in great demand in California. Thus our proposed extension would be mutually beneficial to these sections."

Judge Gilman did not know how soon the railroad case would be decided.

"The interstate commerce commission will first send questionnaires to proponents and opponents of the proposed line," he said. "These questionnaires will reveal the arguments for and against the proposed extensions and, in fact, will show the trend that will be followed at the commission hearing."

"Our survey crews are now assembling and work is beginning to determine what route will be taken south toward Lookout," Judge Gilman was asked whether or not his company preferred a common user arrangement over the Southern Pacific's Modoc Northern railroad as far south as Corvallis.

"We asked to build an independent line, even as we did in the Bend-Klamath project," he answered. "Just how my company feels about the matter of common user, I do not know."

The Great Northern official declined to commit himself on the question of freight rates.

"Any questions in connection with that angle of the situation must be answered by the freight department," he said.

Start Survey

Colonel E. C. Means, assistant chief engineer of the Great Northern, is now in Klamath Falls and is supervising the work of two large survey crews which have already started surveying the territory which the route of the proposed line will follow.

The survey will take in the neighborhood of two months to complete, although the definite time that will be needed will be determined by working conditions and physical characteristics of the proposed route.
