Gasoline Dealers Make 7-Cent Profit

stations for from 9 cents to 12 1/2 cents a gallon.

Distributors All United. A check with the Associated Oil company, General Petroleum corporation, Richfield Oil company, Shell Oil company, Standard Oil company and the Union Oil company distributing plants here shows that retailers in Klamath Falls and vicinity pay 14 1/2 cents a gallon on contract price, or pay a higher price with a rebate that brings the price of the gasoline to them down to the 14 1/2 cent mark.

One service station operator, who is an officer of the Service Station Owners' association, stated yesterday: "The companies set the price for us to sell the gasoline for. It is well known as our invoice."

Retail Price Not Set. A distributing manager for a plant here stated last night that while the companies set the price, at 21 1/2 cents, it is no binding on the retailers and that it really is of no effect, as they may sell the gasoline for any price they choose.

The wholesalers point out that a "gas price war" would perhaps result in station lowering the price in an uneven and "cut throat" manner that would cause a number of stations to lose as much financially that they would be unable to operate.

Give Better "Service." The service station owners stated, when they banded together to keep the price up and prevent the so-called "war," that they expected to give better "service" to the public as a result.

There appears to be no reason given by either the retailers or the wholesalers why the retailers should not all lower the price and take a fair and just profit rather than to pocket all the money which the distributors' war allows. Rather than to pass the reduction on to the public without cutting each other, they have continued to sell the gasoline here at a price of 21 1/2 cents a gallon, pocketing 35 cents on every five gallons sold instead of

the lower profit formerly allowed when the wholesale companies agreed to the dealers for a higher price and still allow the dealers a rate and just profit.

A year ago the new papers of Klamath Falls brought the matter of the price of gasoline in Klamath Falls and the lower price of this valley field to the attention of Robert Finley of Salem, Ashland and Medford before the

public. The price here was accordingly lowered to give the car owners the benefit of the difference and still allow the dealers a rate and just profit.
