

BRADDOCK PINS KAYO ON MAN

Slattery Out in Ninth After Jersey City Boy's Attack

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, N. Y., Mar. 11. (UP)—James J. Braddock, Jersey City heavyweight, scored a technical knockout over Jimmy Slattery of Buffalo after 1 minute and 12 seconds of fighting in the ninth round of a scheduled 10 round bout before a crowd of 15,000 here tonight.

From a time, uninteresting exhibition, the affair developed into a slashing fight about the sixth round. During the early rounds Slattery refused to stand up and fight with Braddock, who chased the fleet-footed Buffalo boy around the ring.

Braddock Attacks
Then Slattery decided to halt his retreat and fight Braddock. The hard-hitting Jersey boy who broke Pete Latzo's jaw and stopped the western sensation, Tuffy Griffiths, in two rounds, hammered Slattery into submission with a series of vicious lefts and rights to the head.

Braddock rocked the Buffalo lad with several rights to the chin near the end of the eighth round, but Slattery came out fresh and cleaved at the start of the ninth.

With the score about even, Slattery tore in to Braddock with both hands, and when he did he walked straight into Braddock's trap.

Topkies to Floor
Driving Slattery back against the ropes with a flashing two-fisted attack, Braddock dazed the Buffalo boy, who covered up with both fists in front of his face.

Slattery never came out of that position until he rolled to the floor.
He attempted to rise on weak knees and Braddock rushed from a neutral corner to finish his man. Referee Lou Magnolia put his arms around Slattery and helped him to his corner, but not before Braddock had hit Slattery once more with his left.

Slattery weighed 168½. Braddock 177½.

SUE TO CLARIFY CONSTITUTION

When Does Pocket Veto Kill Bill? Indian Case Argued

WASHINGTON, March 11. (UP)—The power of the president, exercised for a century to kill bills by failing to act on them at the first sessions of congress, was attacked as unconstitutional by a member of congress, appearing before the supreme court today.

The case, argued on appeal by the Okanogan and other Indian tribes of Washington in a government suit for \$11,000,000, involves the principle which will decide whether the Norris resolution for government operation of the Muscle Shoals power plant is law or not.

Involving a constitutional conflict between legislative and executive powers, the court followed it with great interest, and allowed Representative Hutton Summers of Texas, who represented the house judiciary committee, an extra hour to present his case.

The court adjourned until April 8 after hearing the case.

The pocket veto exercised at the end of the first sessions amounts to an absolute veto—a power which the Constitution writers specifically rejected, Summers argued. Further, he said, it gave the president in these instances power to keep his veto reasons secret.

Summers said the pocket veto custom was based on the assumption and rule that the house of congress in which the bill originated must be in session if a bill is to be returned. He asked the court for a ruling that an officer of the house could receive the bill from the president during a recess. He argued that congress was a continuing entity from the time it first met until it expired on March 4 two years later. The case does not involve bills pocket vetoed—not acted upon—by the president in the ten days before March 4.

In this instance, an act of congress authorized the Indians to sue for money claimed under treaties. President Coolidge did not sign the bill, but the Indians brought the suit on the assumption that it became law, the same as it would if the president failed to act while congress was in session. The court of claims dismissed the suit on motion of the government, holding the bill was not law, and the Indians appealed.

Attorney-General Mitchell, who represented the government, said the custom carried out the "practical construction of the constitutional 10-day requirement and that it should be upheld.

INDIANS MUST FIGHT DISEASE

WASHINGTON, March 11. (UP)—Indian wards of the United States must fight two dread foes—tuberculosis and trachoma—the latter disease affecting as high as 50 per cent of the red men in some parts of Arizona and New Mexico. Dr. M. C. Guthrie, chief medical director of the Indian bureau, said today.

Although trachoma is widespread, it does not account for as many deaths as tuberculosis and pneumonia, he stated in a report on health conditions among the Indians.

Bread Knife Row Is 'Family Fracas'

HOLLYWOOD, Mar. 11. (UP)—The bread knife slashing of Will Mahoney, vaudeville actor, at a party in the apartment of Lenore Conner, of the stage, was described by police tonight as "just a little family fracas."

Mrs. Mahoney became angered at her husband and slashed him with the knife, police said. This was a short time after Mitchell Harris, prominent member of a local stage cast, had been knocked down by Mahoney. Police said that Mahoney was not seriously hurt and that after hospital treatment he and his wife "made up" and went home.

Passengers on Ship Ill, Two Die

SEATTLE, March 11. (UP)—President Madison, American Mail liner, arrived here tonight from the Orient with two steerage passengers dead and two others, victims of spinal meningitis, were rushed to the city hospital.

Five other passengers were sick and five members of the crew were quarantined in the ship's hospital.

THREE KLAMATH MILLS RESUME

Forest, Pelican Bay and Klamath Lumber and Box Running

Three Klamath county mills have resumed operations, after shutdowns and have, or soon will have, their mills working full-capacity. The Forest Lumber company, at Pine Ridge, the Pelican Bay mill, and the Klamath Lumber and Box company, at the mouth of the Klamath, who live on the west side and run a saloon. Arrest and hold will extradite.

The Forest Lumber company started operating on a 10-month lease last week, with a full woods crew getting out logs. P. L. Horan, manager, announced.

The Pelican Bay mill, which has been down since the last week in January, resumed operation on a two-shift basis, employing an additional 100 men.

First load of logs from the logging camp, which has been rolling on the North Mount Scott unit near KRS, arrived at the Pelican Bay plant yesterday. Between 20 and 25 cars of logs will be shipped to the plant daily from now on, mill officers revealed.

The Pelican Bay box factory and planing mill has been operating one shift throughout the winter.

After being shut down through-out the winter, the sawmill of the Klamath Lumber and Box resumed operation yesterday on a one-shift basis. However, company officials explained that a second shift would be inaugurated Tuesday or Wednesday night.

Including the night shift, about 50 additional men will be employed in the Klamath Falls plant.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 11. (UP)—Southern California officials must not be aware that the 18th amendment is being enforced here, according to police, who received a telegram tonight from Chief of Police W. W. Davis of Visalia, Calif., stating that a Portland resident operated a saloon.

The telegram was as follows: "I hold a felony warrant for John Grechenko, who is stopped at the home of Virginia Chiswick or at the home of one Oatbird, who lives on the west side and runs a saloon. Arrest and hold will extradite."

The two doctors, former graduates of Johns Hopkins, are charged with negligence in the treatment of the boy's appendix, which had become inflamed and was found to be perforated.
