

DALEY COMING MAIN-EVENTER

Cleghorn and Cline Head
Card for March 20
At Legion Hall

Slowly but surely Mike Daley, Polican City, middleweight, is working towards the main event class. At first regarded as a good tough preliminary boy, and no more, Mike has battered and slugged his way into the semi-final class by sheer grit and courage.

Possessed of an iron chin, good walling and fighting heart, but lacking a certain finesse and speed, Mike has moved steadily forward and is today the only "home" boy who has attained much distinction.

Daley clashes with Johnny McCoy of Seattle, a fast and clever boxer with a stiff jolting punch in either hand, in the semi-final of the next fight card, March 20, which features as its main event Walter Cleghorn Eskimo middleweight vs. "Tiger" Johnny Cline, San Francisco. If Mike wins decisively, either by decision or knock-out, he has been promised a "hot shot" on a double main event card next April 3.

Tougher and Tougher
In his last seven fights, the Polican City boy has met a tougher opponent each time—McCoy, it is said, will be toughest of all.

Signing up of Cleghorn and Cline for a main event has set the fight fans to not only enthusing over the prospects of the best main event in months, but also to speculating on the courage of the boxing commission in securing such expensive fighters for a Klamath ring.

To tell the truth, the commission and the legion, are gambling on the next card—if the house is packed to the rafters, all will be well; the legion won't make much, but the fans will have seen some great fights.

On the other hand, if it is a mediocre house, the commission must "fork up" an "anti" of a couple of hundred dollars. Increasing support from fight fans has given the commission more confidence and they are willing to do their part by bringing in some really good boys.

Great Fighters
Neither Cleghorn nor Cline are "fast boys". They are at the height of their careers.

Cleghorn has appeared in many Portland and Seattle main events during the past few months while Cline has been going so good that his manager plans to take him on an eastern invasion shortly after the Klamath bout. Cleghorn has one of the greatest lefts in the northwest while Cline is a hooker and slugger.

Preliminary Looks Good
Incidentally, the preliminaries look exceptionally good. Joe Sieff, at one time a great main eventer, and still possessing ring craft and a punch, meets Ted Fanner of Clatsop in one "prelim". Sieff and Eddie Morris drew in the last card.

"Steam Boat" Jackson who soundly whipped William Harrington for three rounds the last card then lost in the fourth on a foul, will be seen in action against Johnny Wilson, Jackson was so upset by the decision which lost his fight to Harrington that he shouted to the fans he would never fight in Klamath again. When he cooled down a bit, he changed his mind and now is anxious to show what he can do. Wilson is a good, strong boxer. It should be a good fight.

Pete Magallanes, the little Filipino who outpointed Harold Wright in a great preliminary of the last card, meets Frankie Monroe, in the curtain raiser. Monroe has come back, his manager claims.

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SINGER, TAYLOR MEET TONIGHT

Taylor Is Underdog: Al
Believes He Will
Win Again

NEW YORK, March 14. (U.P.)—Young Al Singer will travel through the ropes at Madison Square Garden Friday night to face another barrage of fists to the body, this time barrage to be laid by Bud Taylor, the former boxing champion, who lost a previous fight with the Bronx lad on a foul. Taylor feels he really won the previous bout by a knockout; that it was a blow to the solar plexus that leveled Singer rather than a punch below the belt.

Taylor today said he would concentrate again in the reputedly tender midriff of the Bronx youngster.

Singer's claim of a foul, which was allowed in the first Taylor fight, won for him the title of "squeaker" with many fans.

Regardless of the justice of the last, critics are sure he is due for a stormy session with Taylor. Evidence of this is shown in the fact that Bud, who entered the ring for the first time on the short end of 3 to 1 odds, is still the underdog today, but at odds of 7 and 8 to 5.

Taylor is confident of success and is planning another fight with Tony Canzoneri at Chicago if victorious. Victories over Singer and Canzoneri would place him in position to demand a title bout with Andre Rousis, he feels.
