

Greatest Stake Offered in Race At Tijuana Today

TIJUANA, Mex., March 16. (UP)—The greatest stake a horse race ever carried—\$100,000 added, will call 20 or more of the world's fastest thoroughbreds to post in the 10th annual running of the Cofreth handicap here tomorrow.

The winner of the event will take away between \$98,000 and \$102,000, depending on the number elected to start when the roll is called in the morning.

And 25,000 racing fans, most of them with their hearts and pocketbooks on a favorite, will watch the horses run the mile and a quarter.

Genie, owned by G. A. Cochran, will carry most of the money. Due to his seasonal record and his test runs here, he was quoted at 2 to 1 by the bookmakers tonight.

Genie will be ridden by Willie Kelsay, whose 12 years' experience will stand him well in the crowded field tomorrow. Genie will carry the greatest weight, 126 pounds.

Golden Prince, of the Sunshot stable, said to be good at any distance and who had taken seven purses so far this season, will be backed heavily.

Golden Prince never has tried the mile and a quarter, but carrying only 115 pounds, he is expected to give Genie and the others plenty of trouble.

Hydramel, owned by Senator J. A. Camden; Alexander Panagiotis, named after the theatre magnate to whose stable he belongs; and Dr. Wilson, who carries the color of Jack Dempsey, former heavyweight champion, are other favorites.

Medford High Is State Champion In Basketball

WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY, Salem, March 16. (UP)—Medford high school won the Oregon state high school basketball championship here tonight by defeating Astoria high, 25 to 14.

Medford led the end of the first quarter, 4 to 0. At half time it was 8 to 5 in favor of the team picked, Astoria playing better in this period. Medford better far out in front in the third quarter, running the score to 22-8.

The Astoria team appeared weak in comparison with its offensive against Washington last night, and the whole game was much slower than many of the preliminary games of the tournament. A foot injury to Larson, fast fisherman forward, slowed him down considerably and his teammates seemed to be affected by his slump.

Judge Landis Hits Eleven Clubs, Ten Baseball Players

CHICAGO, March 16. (UP)—In one of his characteristic "let the blow fall where it may" decisions, Judge Kenesaw Mountain Landis, high commissioner of organized baseball, today released ten baseball players, valued at \$100,000 or more, from their contracts and imposed fines of \$5,000 on 11 clubs.

The judge declared that the clubs, including Washington, Philadelphia, Cleveland and St. Louis in the American league, had violated the major and minor league rules by failing to truthfully report actual transactions.

He stated specifically that "the St. Louis Browns, general manager of Cleveland, and Phil Hall, owner of the St. Louis Browns, had represented their clubs as 'maintaining absolute integrity' in certain deals investigated, whereas 'subsequent investigation revealed that they had concealed facts'."

Player deals were kept "under cover" by the clubs, the commissioner said, "dumpty" checks being sent to the commissioner's office for purchases actually made.

RESOLUTION OF INTENTION A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION TO CONSTRUCT A SEWER IN DARTMOUTH ADDITION AND A PORTION OF MILLS ADDITION TO THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON, TO BE KNOWN AS SEWER UNIT NO. 12.

The City Engineer, pursuant to a resolution of the Common Council heretofore adopted, having on the 25th day of February, 1929, filed his plans and specifications and estimates for the cost of installing and making what is known as the 13th Sewer Unit in Dartmouth Addition and a portion of Mills Addition to the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, embracing in said unit all of the property heretofore bounded and described; and the Council having taken the same under advisement and finding said plans, specifications and estimates satisfactory.

BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED that the said plans, specifications, and estimates for the construction and installing and making of what is known as the 13th Sewer Unit, be and the same are hereby approved.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, and the Common Council hereby declares its intention to construct and install the 13th Sewer Unit in accordance with the said plans and specifications and estimates; that this project consists of constructing separate pipe sewer together with all necessary manholes, lamp holes, "Y" branches and appurtenances, being a complete separate sewer system in Dartmouth Addition and a portion of Mills Addition to the City of Klamath Falls, by placing therein said slanted vitrified sewer pipes with "Y's", manholes, lamp holes and the like; or concrete sewer pipes made according to the specifications for concrete sewer pipes as set forth in the plans and specifications on file with the Police Judge, at a total estimate cost of Twenty-eight thousand seven hundred eighty-two and 50/100 dollars (\$28,782.50), for vitrified pipes, and Twenty-eight thousand seven hundred eighty-two and 50/100 dollars (\$28,782.50), for concrete pipes, said estimate in other event to include engineering supervision, advertising, clerical assistance and unforeseen contingencies.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Common Council that the property heretofore described be and is hereby declared to be benefited by the construction and installation of said sewer system to-wit: All of the property embraced within the following boundaries, to-wit: Beginning at the southwest corner of block 311, Dartmouth Addition, to the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon; thence easterly along the northerly line of Grant Way to the westerly line of Washburn Way; thence northerly along the westerly line of Washburn Way to the southerly line of the U. S. Government Canal right-of-way; thence westerly along the southerly line of said canal to the northwesterly corner of lot 5, block 125, Mills Addition to the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon; thence in a southeasterly direction along the southeasterly line of lot 5, block 125, of said addition to the northerly line of Orchard avenue; thence in a southeasterly direction across Orchard avenue to the northwest corner of lot 34, block 125, Mills Addition to the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon; thence southerly along the line between lots 34 and 35, and 35 and 36, block 125, of said addition to the northerly line of Garden avenue; thence westerly along the northerly line of Garden avenue to the easterly line of Division street; thence southerly along the easterly line of Division street to the point of beginning.

Said property above described shall be and the same is hereby declared to be benefited and assessed for the expense of said Sewer Unit.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Monday the 1st day of April, 1929, at the hour of 8 o'clock, p.m., at the Council Chambers in the City Hall of Klamath Falls, Oregon, be fixed as the time and place for hearing objections or remonstrances against the construction and installation of said 13th Sewer Unit.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Police Judge be and he is hereby authorized and directed to cause a notice of said hearing to be published as provided by the city charter, State of Oregon, County of Klamath, City of Klamath Falls.

Fifteen Witnesses Have Testified Against Baker

With testimony of fifteen government witnesses in and with four others yet to be called, the government's case against Burton Baker, Klamath Indian, charged with the murder of Bill Riddle on Thanksgiving eve, is drawing to a close, according to T. R. Gillenwaters, special federal prosecutor, who returned here yesterday from Portland, Federal Judge McNary adjourned court until Monday morning.

Gillenwaters, who is deputy district attorney of Klamath, is assisting in the prosecution of Baker at the request of United States District Attorney George Neuner.

The deputy prosecutor was cautioned over the government's case against Baker. He will turn to Portland today.

Klamath witnesses in the case who returned home for the week-end included Federal Officer L. C. Mueller, and Reservation Officers George McNabb and Frank Rogers.

"Looks as if half the Indians of the Klamath tribe are up there at the trial," commented Mueller.

"There is considerable interest in the trial in Portland," Mueller said he had been called to the stand by the government to testify concerning the purported verbal confession made by Baker. Mueller will be recalled to the stand later. He took a prominent part in the investigation which led to the capture of Baker.

Tuesday, March 19, promises to be one of the biggest nights in the history of the local post.

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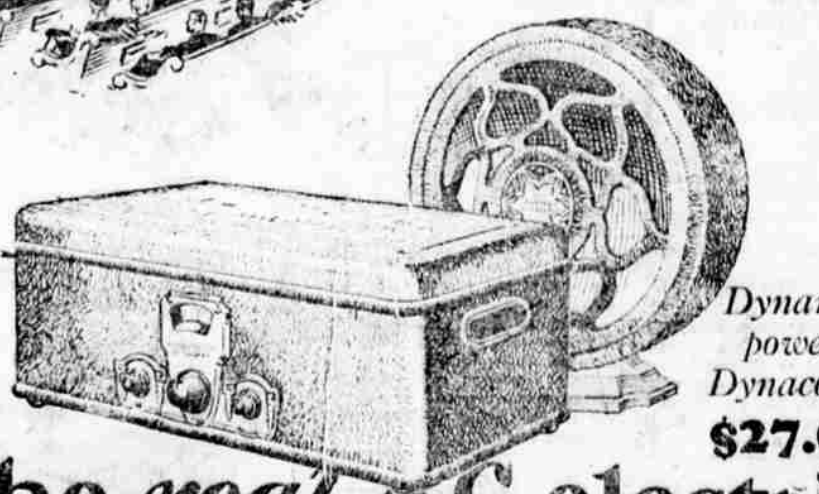
