

Cline, Cleghorn Clash Tonight

Entire Card to Set New Record, Filipino Is Back

Two of the best main events on the coast will meet tonight in a card which marks the opening of the fight season in Klamath Falls. The card is on a par with cards in Portland, Tacoma and Seattle.

Walter Cleghorn, 156 pounds, an Eskimo Indian, who has fought many fights in Portland and Seattle, will meet "Tiger" Johnny Cline, 155 pounds, who fought a main event in Chicago when Ace Hudkins fought in the semi-final. At that time Cline was Dave Shade.

Eskimo Has Own Style
It is undoubtedly the best fight that has ever been shown in Klamath Falls. Many who have never before attended the cards here have risked the cards for the event which starts tonight at 8:45. A new ring and some new seats will also go to make the battles tonight the best ever shown. Arthur will referee and Franny will announce.

The Eskimo is a well known fighter with a style all his own. He starts by wearing the other man out and then leaps at the man with a left to the solar plexus and a right which follows to the heart. He is a body puncher from the islands of the north.

Cline Uses Heat
Cline is a high class fighter with technique and brains. He has a husky punch that backs up knowledge of when and how to hit. His long record of victories over prominent fighters tells better than anything what he can do. Cline is from San Francisco. Cleghorn makes his headquarters in Seattle, and works out of Louie Austin's stables.

It is a fight that fans in Portland would be glad to have a chance to see and will be a match that will be talked about here for some time yet to come.

Daly-McCoy
In the semi-windup Mike Daly, Pelican City, will tangle with Johnny McCoy. Daly is a corner according to Joe Bickerstaff, matchmaker. Daly and his successor wins here are too well known to need comment.

McCoy is another from Austin and Bishop's stables with a fine record in the boxing country, Tacoma and Seattle. He will give Daly a good fast time for six rounds.

Sellstaff vs. Tanner
Joe Sellstaff, a former main eventer, who meets Ted Tanner, a local man who has returned to the ring after a six months' lay-off, still has plenty to show fans.

Magallanes-Monroe
Pete Magallanes, the classy little Filipino, who took Harold Wright in the opener on the last card, will meet Frankie Monroe tonight. The Filipino is fast, clever and trimmed Wright on points.

Whether or not he can repeat tonight is a guess. Monroe has shown here before and has displayed some good boxing and fast footwork. In Seattle, Tacoma and Aberdeen the Filipino has been booked many times as a double main eventer and as a semi-windup man. He has a whole scrap book of clippings to show whom he has beaten and when and where. The Filipino is already a favorite here because of the showing he made here in his last fight.

Carey Accepts Head of Garden, Marks Big Change

NEW YORK, March 19. (UP)—The prosperity and popularity of the profession of pugilism was attested today when W. F. Carey was elected to and accepted the job of president of the Madison Square Garden corporation.

The introduction of a man of Carey's stamp into the fistie panorama marks the final step of boxing in to the realm of big business.

Heretofore, there had been Tex Rickard and no others. Tex was a genius in the matter of fight promoting, and in no other respect. Sound business men marveled at him, but few really solid citizens tried to imitate him.

It was generally felt that while Rickard, in some mysterious manner, "got away with it," prize fighting was still only a short step removed from six day bike riding, terrapin racing and three card monte.

But this "Bill" Carey whom the directors of Madison Square Garden have chosen as their new president, is very much of a businessman. For one thing he is many times a millionaire and he made the money himself.

Col. John S. Hammond, who aspired to the position of president, was retained as vice-president. Bernard F. Gimbel was elected a director to fill the place made vacant by Rickard's.

Tilden, Hunter Not to Play in Davis Cup Match

NEW YORK, March 19. (UP)—William T. Tilden, H. captain of last year's Davis cup team and ranking U. S. player, and Francis T. Hunter, No. 2 in the national ranking, will not be available for Davis cup play in the American zone, the United States lawn tennis association announced today.

Tilden and Hunter have entered the national indoor doubles championship at the 7th regiment armory, being seeded first of four strong teams. Shortly after the championships, which will be resumed tomorrow, "Big Bill" and his partner will sail for Europe.

The other seeded teams in the national indoor doubles, the draw for which was announced today, are Borotra and Washburn, Aylmer and Rosenkafellow, and Hall and Griffin.

The squad from which the players for the American Davis cup team will be selected will include George Lott of Chicago, John Van Ryn of East Orange, N. J., Wilmer Allison of Fort Worth, Texas, John Hennessey of Indianapolis and several others yet to be named.

May Construct Scenic Tramway On Mount Shasta

ST. SHASTA, March 18.—Reliable information reaching here indicates that H. D. Brown of St. Shasta has received a federal permit to build a scenic tramway to the summit of towering Mount Shasta and that he would arrive home about April 1 to actively take up the matter of a preliminary survey for the road.

It has been known for several years that Brown was much interested in the building of a tramway or some means of making ascent to the top of Mount Shasta that would make it possible for anyone to reach the top.

The matter of a federal permit to construct the line has been hanging fire a year or more. The reported granting of the permit

may mean that steps will be taken in the near future to proceed with the enterprise, although it is possible that nothing definite will be done about it right away.—Ashland Tidings.

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Merrill, Malin Play at Ashland In Tournament

Brilliant basketball, and play which would do credit in a state tournament, was featured in the big two-day invitational basketball tournament held in Ashland under the auspices of the Southern Oregon Normal school.

The only two Klamath county teams entered in the tournament were Merrill and Malin. In the elimination games Malin won a victory over the Rogue River team by a score of 14-17, and the Merrill players won over Glendale by a score of 21-12.

The close of the games to determine first-round champions found Malin a victor over Middleton, score 24-17. Although the Merrill team played in this series, it was beaten by Drain, 23-18.

Malin lost out of the tournament in the second round when the Klamath basin team was beaten by Coos River, 23-12.

The silver championship trophy was awarded to the team from Drain, and a bronze trophy was awarded the Powers team for winning the consolation contest.
