Mrs. S. P. Hall arrived Wednesday from Eau Claire, Wis. She is stopping at the Willard while in the city.

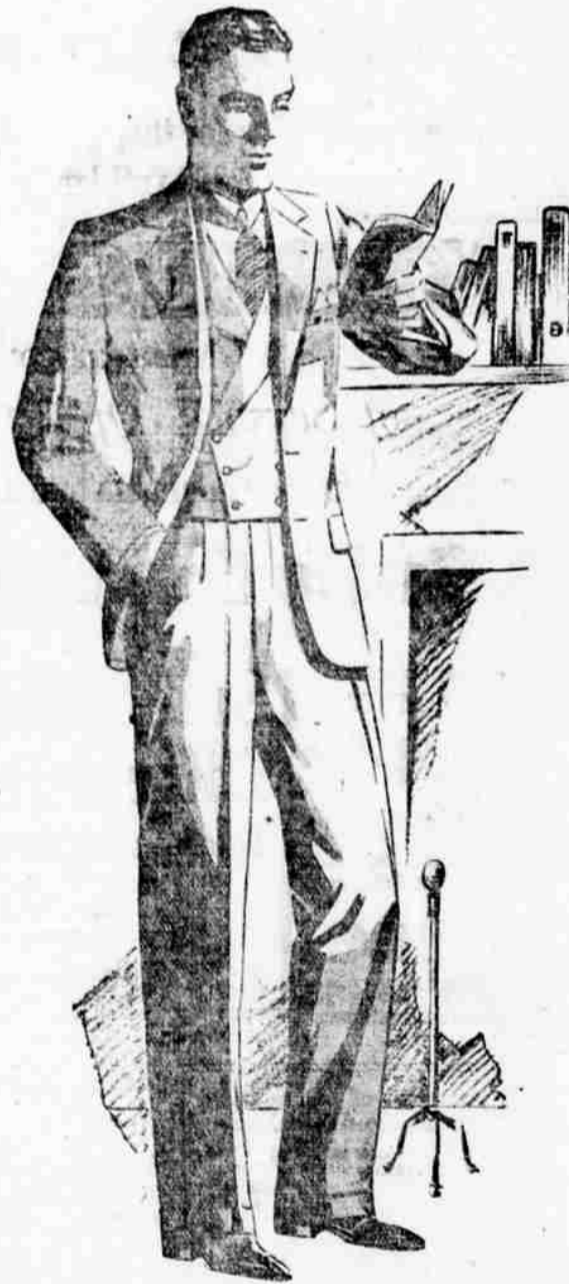
