Girl Swears Tom Mooney in Prison On Forced Word

SAN FRANCISCO, March 20. (UP)—Perjured testimony sent Tom Mooney to prison for the massacre of 19 persons during the 1916 Preparedness day parade here, an affidavit made today by a major witness in the case, Katielle Smith, contended.

Miss Smith, sworn to before a notary public here and signed the affidavit which increased the tenacity of movements to secure Mooney's freedom from San Quentin state prison.

The blast which resulted in blood shed during the parade was virtually heard around the world, since Mooney's trial attracted universal attention. Mooney was sentenced to hang and finally escaped the death penalty by commutation of sentence by the governor of California after the president of the United States was asked to intervene.

The woman claimed in the document that she had offered false testimony after threats of a prosecuting attorney that she would be sent to San Quentin state prison unless she obeyed him.

Miss Smith claimed she was furnished drugs to keep up her courage while she was on the witness stand.

Girls Identify Barnett for Act

OAKLAND, Calif., March 20. (UP)—David A. Barnett, former wealthy resident of Toledo, Ohio, has been identified by seven school girls as the man who attempted to lure them into an automobile. District Attorney Earl Warren announced here late today.

The girls, according to Warren, are pupils at the Erick school which was attended by Mabel Mayer, 16, who was murdered two years ago after she was attacked.

Strikers Study New Wage Offer

ELIZABETHTON, Tenn., March 20. (UP)—Indications of an early end to the strike of artificial silk and yarn workers, involving several thousand girls and boy employees, was seen here tonight when union officials considered an offer from company officials of a new wage scale.

General Caswell Boyd, state adjutant, reported the new offer to Paul Aymon, president of the State Federation of Labor. It offers a 2 cent per hour increase, making the minimum for a 56-hour week \$19.95, against the previous \$8.96.

Railroad Rate Hearing Will Be In Medford Soon

PORTLAND, March 20. (UP)—The interstate commerce commission hearing on application of the Southern Pacific to establish new freight rates between San Francisco, Portland and Seattle

to meet water competition will be resumed in Medford Friday morning. It was announced following adjournment here today. Communities south of Portland will express their opposition to the change at the Medford hearing on grounds that a reduction in port-to-port rates should be accompanied by a corresponding slash in tariffs to intermediate points.

U. C. Nelson, secretary of the Beaver Portland Cement company, whose plant is at Gold Hill, Ore., testified today against the application of the Southern Pacific, contending that even the existing rates are discriminatory against his company.

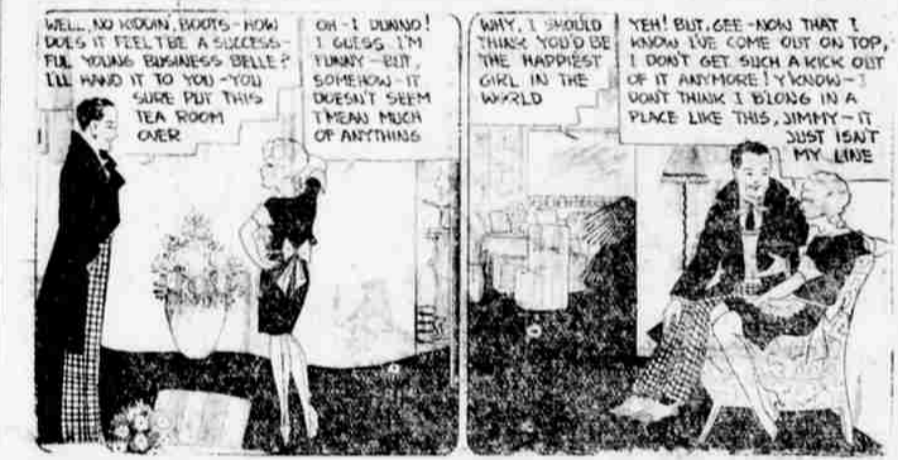
