

SEGRAVE WINS BOAT TITLE

"Miss England" Outruns "Miss America VII" in Water Race

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., March 21. (UP)—The international speed boat racing title went across the sea to England today as the result of a race entirely devoid of the element of competition.

Major H. O. D. Segrave added the water title to his automobile laurels when he sent his "Miss England" creeping across the finish line on Biscayne bay this afternoon five minutes behind the "Miss America VII."

Wins 3 to 2

He was officially credited with winning the two-boat race with three points, as against two for the American speedboat king.

Wood's boat flashed around the two-mile course in the elapsed time of 11 minutes, 45.35 seconds, for an average speed of 61.275 miles an hour. Segrave's craft, which had been badly buffeted in the first heat yesterday and had been patched in 15 places, sprung a leak after the start of today's race and at the finish was barely moving. The Englishman finished in the time of 16 minutes, 50.19 seconds, for an average of little more than 42 miles an hour.

Leads Slow Speed

The victory went to the English driver on the basis of points scored, Wood having been forced from the first heat yesterday with no points.

Segrave had announced prior to the start of the heat today that he would not try for high speed due to the condition of his boat. He was nearly two laps behind the American craft at the end of the race. "Miss England" had sprung a leak while rounding the first turn in the fourth lap, slowing her speed to bare headway.

Malcolm Pope of Winterhaven, Fla., won the Colonel E. H. R. Green trophy for outboard motor boats, with "Lookin' Back Kid," when he averaged 32.376 miles an hour for the second heat.

200 Quit Strike, Many Yet Parade

ELIZABETHTON, Tenn., March 21. (UP)—Some 200 striking employees of the rayon and artificial silk plants here returned to work today, while the main body of the protesting workers paraded the streets of Elizabethton.

Leaders of the textile union, organized among the workers toward obtaining a wage increase, today began preparation of a resolution outlining conditions under which the employees would return to their posts.

Three Advance to Semi-Finals in Tennis Tourney

NEW YORK, March 21. (UP)—Jean Borotra, Frank Hunter and William Ayndotte, ranking favorites to capture the National Indoor Tennis championship, advanced to the semi-final round of the annual tournament today.

Julius Seligson, another seeded player, who defeated Gregory Macula, 6-4, 6-2, today, is the fourth semi-finalist.

Borotra's quarter final victory came after a hard fight with J. G. Hall, who forced the first set to 15 games and the second to 10. The final scores were 10-8, 6-4.

Hunter found the competition easier in the quarter final, eliminating H. L. Bowman in straight sets, 6-4, 6-4.

Ayndotte defeated Harry Kunk, 6-1, 6-2.

Borotra tomorrow faces Ayndotte, defending champion, for the right to meet the winner of the Hunter-Seligson match in the final. Borotra and Hunter are the favorites.

In the doubles Ayndotte and Rockafellow, defending champions, advanced through the third round, defeating Jacobs and Polstein, 3-7, 6-2.

Thelen and Hunter, seeded No. 1, won three matches today, only by default. In their second round match they defeated Harte and Swaybill, 6-2, 6-2. Culer and Anderson defeated Hall and Griffin, 6-3, 4-6, 7-5, while Borotra and Washburn won their third round match from Hammett and Manchester, 6-3, 6-1.

Four Golfers Tie In Semi-Finals

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., March 21. (UP)—Four golfers, representing the south, west and north, emerged from the rank and file of a field of America's foremost linksmen this afternoon tied for first honors in the qualifying round of the second annual \$15,000 La Gorce open tournament.

At Watrous of Detroit, Ed Dudley of Los Angeles, Frank Ball of Atlanta and George Chris of Davenport, Fla., finished the 36-hole grind in 142 strokes each. Only one of this quartet—Chris—was among the leaders at the end of the 18 holes, while Ball was far down the list at that stage with a 76. Ball returned a card of 68 in the afternoon round to land a field of 50 golfers which included most of the best known professionals in the country.

AINTREE RACE CLASSIC TODAY

American Horses Entered in Steeplechase in England

AINTREE, Liverpool, England, March 21. (UP)—It rained all day at Aintree, and the contest for the Grand National Steeplechase is a quagmire.

This greatest of jumping races, which is drawing 150,000 race fans to the picturesque courses near Liverpool, thus becomes a most uncertain sporting fixture. Anything may happen when the barrier is sprung at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

The victory of a 100 to 1 shot—Tipperary Tim—in last year's race may be duplicated. British racing experts are at a loss regarding tomorrow's classic.

An American-owned horse, "Joek," Whitney's "Easter Hero," still is favorite, despite his heavy impost.

35 to 40 Entries

Billy Barton, Howard Bruce, American jumpers, which finished second last year after falling at the last jump, arrived at the course tonight, closely watched. The Baltimore horse has been stabled near the track, and appears to be in excellent fettle.

Despite the rain which fell incessantly, making the terrible jumps of Aintree even more uninspiring, the entry list did not diminish to any appreciable extent today. Until the overnight scratches are announced, the number of starters can only be estimated, but it is figured that between 35 and 45 horses will go to the post.

Mazatlan Held by Mexican Federals

The United States troops here warned officers of the federal garrison that if bullets dropped in Naco, Ariz., he would drive both federals and rebels into the hills.

The Americans mounted extra machine guns along the boundary line when word of the proposed attack reached them. There are 1,000 cavalrymen and infantrymen in Major Hazeltine's command.

General Escobar, who arrived here early today on a special train from Jimenez, where he left his main army after evacuating Tucson, denied that he had fled the city.

Blz. Gen. George Van Horn Moseley, commandant of Fort Bliss, Tex., conferred with General Escobar this afternoon for almost two hours in the drawing room of the rebel chief's private car. After the parley spokesmen for both generals denied that peace negotiations had been discussed. General Escobar stated positively there will be no overtures from his side for a truce.

Unofficially it was understood General Moseley reached a full and complete understanding with General Escobar relative to fighting along the American boundary, which might endanger American lives.

Escobar expressed his complete disbelief in dispatches today reporting the execution of General Jesus Aguirre, commander of the Vera Cruz rebels, by saying:

"General Aguirre at this moment is with a strong column of loyal revolutionist troops marching from Tierra Blanca, second largest city in Mexico. Reports of his execution are absurd."

NOGALES, Sonora, March 21. (UP)—Reports to rebel headquarters tonight said that General Armenta, who recently defected from insurgent troops at Ortiz, had entered Chihuahua City today to rejoin the revolutionary forces.

The bulletin said that General Armenta was accompanied by 350 soldiers and that they were extended all courtesies by General Marcelo Caraveo.

General Gonzalo Escobar, supreme commander of the revolution, said today that he had fled the city.

MEXICO CITY, March 21. (UP)—With one of the chief leaders of the rebellion executed by a firing squad, the government made preparations today to strengthen the federal position at Mazatlan, where a battle was reported imminent.

General Jesus M. Aguirre, who conducted the revolt in Vera Cruz, was executed by a firing squad at Llaneros this morning, a statement from the presidential said. There were no details of the execution, which was reported to have been at sunrise.
