Membership Dues Set at Meeting Of Tennis Club

The Klamath Falls Tennis club launched out on a number of plans for the season, made definite rules for collecting club dues, and discussed improvement of city courts at a meeting held in the city hall last night.

After some discussion, a decision was made to divide all members of the club into a junior and senior division for purposes of holding tournaments and for levying club fees. An initiation fee of one dollar will be charged to all members under 18 unless they have a desire to play in the senior division. A fee of three dollars will be charged to all members in the senior division. Besides this each member will pay a fee of 50 cents a month from April 1 until October 1.

After members have paid the initiation fee, only the 50-cent fee will be levied upon them the remainder of the time they are in the club. Fees may be remitted at the Klamath Sporting Goods store on South Seventh street.

Only members of the club will be allowed to play in tennis tournaments staged in this city. The club will furnish all balls and nets for the tournaments and take care of the courts.

Information and cost of lighting courts is to be obtained by the club secretary, James Floyd, since a number of the members wish to be able to play in the evening after dark.

The by-laws of the club will be drawn up after Mr. Huls, who is now in the south on a vacation, and is visiting at a number of clubs, returns with data on by-laws of other clubs. However, court rules are to be drawn up by the executive committee at once and presented to the park board for approval. The executive committee will meet next Thursday evening for this purpose.

Bootleggers Pay Big Income Tax

PORTLAND, March 21, (UP)—Bootleggers in Oregon paid approximately \$10,000 in federal income taxes during the past four years, Clyde G. Huntley, collector of internal revenue, said today in submitting his 1928 income tax return for the state. Returns for the year aggregated \$1,254,572.64, an increase of \$127,595.91 over 1927. A total of 36,275 residents of the state made returns on 1928 incomes, the report showed.

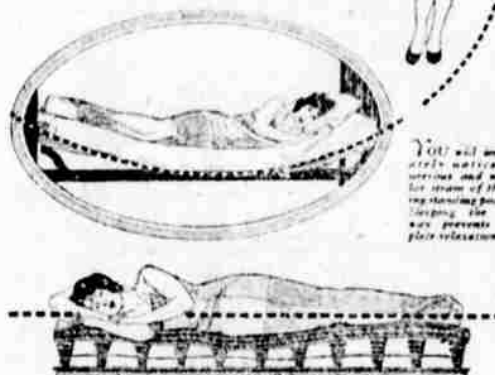

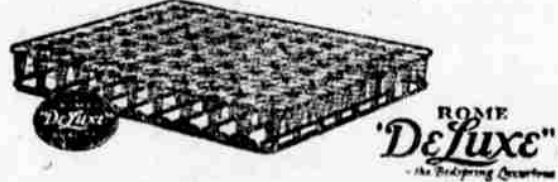

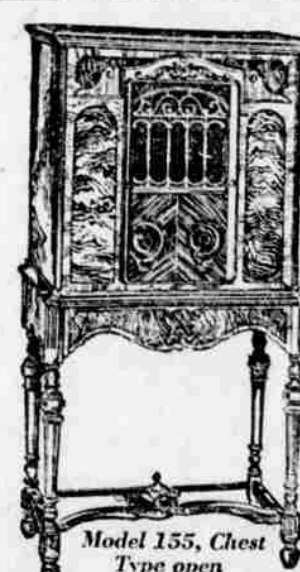
