The Indian woman related that John, at his own request, accompanied Ward and herself on the night of February 5 to attend a liquor party at a cabin in the "cabbage patch," a district of the reservation town.

She testified that her cousin became enraged when Ward asked her to accompany him to his room. John slashed her with a knife and then inflicted fatal wounds on Ward, she asserted.

John McArgie, who lived in a cabin 90 feet from the one in which Ward was killed, testified that he saw the Weeks woman at the window of the death cabin on the morning of the murder.

Frank C. Rogers and L. D. Arnold, Klamath reservation officers, and T. R. Giffenwaters, assistant district attorney of Klamath county, told of the confession John made of the slaying and advised that he talked very readily of the crime and admitted his guilt.

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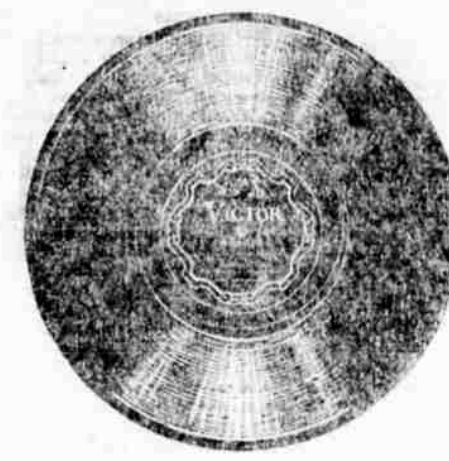
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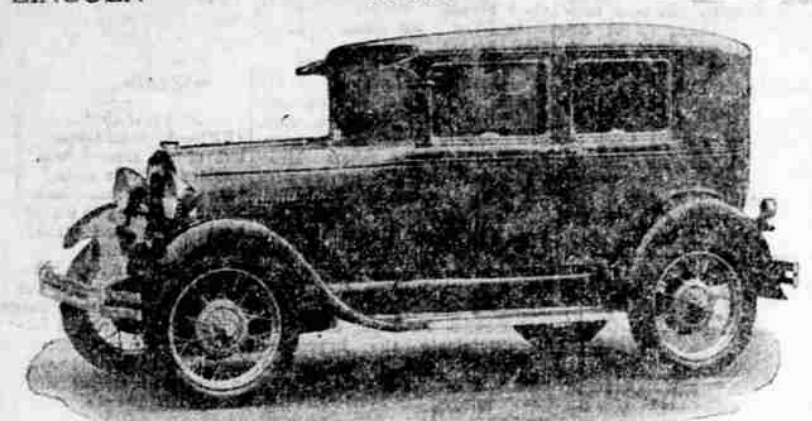
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
