

P. C. L. WILL OPEN TUESDAY

Opening Games in North April 9-14; Nines Gain Strength

SAN FRANCISCO, March 23. (UP)—Baseball fans in four California cities were pulling down the curtain on the "Hot Stove" league tonight, getting ready for the real thing, which will be presented next Tuesday with the official opening of the Pacific Coast League.

Because residents of the Golden State claim that nowhere is the sun so reliable as in California, the opening games will be played at San Francisco, Oakland, Sacramento and Los Angeles.

Seattle and Portland, the two out-of-state cities represented in the league, must wait until the third week of the season, April 9 to 14, before Pacific Northwest fans will have an opportunity to urge favorites to do unusual things with clubs of hickory and pellets of horsehide.

If the weather is good, new attendance records should be established in several instances. In San Francisco there is much speculation over the strength of the Seals, champions of last year. The team, as did all of them, looked good in practice but the fans want to see how it behaves in real competition. Portland will oppose the Seals in the opener.

Teams Stronger

Hollywood will play Sacramento on Tuesday, the Missions clash with Oakland, and Seattle meets Los Angeles.

Most of the teams have added strength during the winter. Sacramento, however, presents virtually the same line-up which won the second half pennant a year ago, finally losing to the Seals in the title playoff, the Seals having won the pennant for the first time.

Reuther Switches

The most interesting switch during the spring was the release of Dutch Reuther, former big league star who won 22 games for the champion Seals in 1928. This year Reuther will be in a San Francisco Mission uniform.

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., March 23. (UP)—Gar Wood failed to lower his world's speedboat record in his Miss America VII over a measured mile course here this afternoon.

Six runs by the Detroit speedboat enthusiast failed to crack the record average of 52.838 miles per hour made by the Miss America VII in six runs at Detroit last September with Wood's brother George at the wheel.

After the trials today, Wood announced he would change the propellers of his boat and make another attempt to break the record.

Baseball League Formed With Six County Schools

U. S. Athletes Star for Oxford In Track Meet

STAMFORD BRIDGE, Eng., March 23. (UP)—Cambridge University, not satisfied with an annihilating Oxford in the annual boat race on the Thames today, administered another drubbing in the annual track and field meeting, winning seven out of eleven events. A crowd of 20,000, including Premier Stanley Baldwin and Lord Birkenhead, witnessed the event.

Cambridge won the 220-yard low hurdles, the 100-yard dash, the mile, 120-yard hurdles, quarter mile, half mile, and broad jump. Oxford won the pole vault, high jump, three-mile run and shot put.

An American athlete, McGill, formerly of the University of Florida, now of Christ Church college, Oxford, won the pole vault for Oxford, leaping 11 feet 4 inches. McGill, formerly of Princeton, now of Balliol college, Oxford, won another first for Oxford in the shot-put with a heavy of 44 feet 3 inches.

Rebels Attacking Town of Mazatlan

Mazatlan, notified the embassy here tonight that all Americans in Mazatlan are safe.

The body of General Jesus Aguirre, rebel leader in Vera Cruz who was executed by a firing squad of federals a few days ago, was buried in the French cemetery today, with only a small group of mourners attending. His widow plans to go to the United States.

The defenders of Mazatlan played searchlights upon the attacking rebels and electrified barbed wire entanglements in front of the trenches during the night, according to advisers connected by the Presidential here. Those operating the searchlights reported they had seen rebels carrying away their dead.

The last report from General Carrillo was at 1 p. m. Mexico City time, when he reported that the federal artillery bombardment of the rebel positions had been resumed and that the rebels were unable to advance.

Reports from Mazatlan indicate the troops of General Jaime Carrillo, in command of the federal forces there, number approximately 7,000, whereas the attacking and attacking forces are estimated at from 3,000 to 2,500.

The Mazatlan communique said most of the fighting is occurring along the railroads and highways and in "Graveyard No. 3," where the rebels are firing from behind tombstones.

Part of the federal gunboat force is being directed toward the cemetery to drive out the rebels. The only mention of casualties was one federal wounded.

EL PASO, Tex., March 23. (UP)—A land and air attack on Mexico City is the dream which General J. G. Escobar, rebel chief, hopes to realize through his efforts to raise funds to support the revolt.

Escobar, whose headquarters have been in Juarez, Chihuahua, since early Thursday, came to the frontier with the dual purpose of replenishing the rebel coffers and to draft plans for the assault on the capital, rebel leaders said today.

Airmen Volunteer

Airmen will play an important part in the attack, with many of them piloted by American fliers, Escobar revealed. American and British World War airmen and civilian pilots who have enlisted in that section of the Escobar flying service known as the "Yankee Doodle Squadron," did so as a direct result of the general's visit here, rebel spokesmen declared.

Reports of weakening morale in the ranks of the federal forces have strengthened rebel hopes of victory, while recruits are daily pledging allegiance to the revolutionary movement, Escobar said.

Generals Join Escobar

Two generals in the federal Mexican army during the Oregon administration, exiled in San Antonio, Tex., since 1925, joined General Escobar today, in addition to a former colonel and four lieutenant colonels. The officers were Generals Vidal Silva and Jose Cosme, Colonel Onesimo Jimenez, Augustin Carrillo and Francisco Casagane.

WASHINGTON, March 23. (UP)—Mexican rebel forces have penetrated the state of Sinaloa south of the city of Mazatlan, but there is no indication they have captured the city from the federal garrison, the state department announced today. Ambassador Morrow informed the department 400 rebels made a short attack on the city yesterday and retired to the north, but the two railroad bridges were

sheltering thousands of homeless.

TIJUANA RACE TRACK, Tijuana, Mexico, March 23. (UP)—Thirteen long distance handicapped stars were named over night to start in the \$16,000 two-mile Tijuana cup to be run here tomorrow afternoon. Top weight of 122 pounds will be carried by Genie, who made such a miserable showing in the Coffroth handicap, in which he had been named the favorite last Sunday.

Golden Prince, winner of the Coffroth, is second high with 112 pounds. He will be ridden by Jockey Jack Parnas, who piloted him over the winning course. Hydromel, the giant from the stable of Johnson N. Candiani, may go to the post a favorite in the rich stake. He will have the services of Jockey C. E. Allen and will carry 112 pounds. He has received a rush of last-minute sentiment.

The track probably will be fast, and fair weather has been promised.

NAGUA, Azua, March 23. (UP)—Doubtful of the location of revolutionary troops expected to attack them within 48 hours, federal forces holding Nagua, Pinar, quietly prepared for the battle tonight.

Reports from outside sources said General Faustino Topete, leading 2,500 insurgents, was only 10 miles from the city, but federal outposts had not sighted the enemy.

NOGALES, Sonora, Mex., March 23. (UP)—A report that William Blocker, 35, American consul at Mazatlan, Sinaloa, had been killed in the heavy fighting there was not true and had its origin in the streets of this city. Henry Damm, American consul in Nogales, Ariz., wired the state department in Washington today.

London Rowing Club Holds Title

LONDON, March 23. (UP)—The London Rowing club retained its championship in the annual head of the river race, from Mortlake to Putney Bridge, the reverse of the course rowed earlier in the day by the Cambridge and Oxford crews. The London club defeated the Thames Rowing club in an exciting finish in 19 minutes, 24 seconds, the exact time of the Cambridge crew in defeating Oxford. The Thames club's time was a second longer. Sixty crews participated in the race.

SUSPEND SANDWINA

LONDON, March 23. (UP)—The boxing board of control today suspended Ted Sandwina indefinitely pending investigation of his fights with Phil Scott and Charlie Smith. In both fights Sandwina was disqualified.

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
