

PACIFIC COAST LEAGUE WILL OPEN TODAY

Badly Crippled Beavers Meet San Francisco In First Game

LOS ANGELES, March 25. (U.P.)—Right baseball teams rejuvenated during the long winter months will open the 27th annual race for the Pacific coast league pennant in four cities today.

From three states, all will open their campaigns on California fields.

Seattle will play Los Angeles on Wright field here. Hollywood will go to Sacramento.

Portland vs. Seals.

In the bay region, San Francisco vs. Seals will entertain the badly crippled Portland team while the San Francisco Missions take a ferry to Oakland for the first week.

Weather forecasts indicated that it might be slightly cloudy or the openers, but that the elements will not force any postponements.

From all four cities came reports of promises of well filled grandstands and bleachers.

The eyes of many fans will be leveled on the Portland team, handicapped by the tragic death of Denny Williams, star outfielder, in an automobile crash which probably will keep three other players out of the game.

JACKIE FIELDS NEW CHAMPION

Dundee Recognized in N. Y.; Small Riots Stop Fight in Eighth

CHICAGO, Mar. 25. (U.P.)—Jackie Fields, a Jew from Chicago's west side tonight stepped into recognition as the welter-weight champion of the world when he outpointed Young Jack Thompson, a negro from California, in ten rounds.

Fields now is recognized as the title holder by the National boxing commission, who ruled that Joe Dundee had failed to defend his crown under the rules of the organization.

Dundee, however, is still recognized as the champion of his class by the New York Boxing commission.

The fight was interrupted in the eighth round by a brief riot which broke loose when a rumbling noise arose in the south end of the Coliseum and continued until the spectators were assured there was no reason for alarm.

Woman Swimmer Wishes to Try Klamath Waters

Leo Fourrier, Los Angeles, world's champion woman swimmer, is anxious to break her record of 57 hours, officially timed, in some water of Klamath county.

Yesterday, Earl C. Reynolds, executive secretary of the chamber of commerce, received a letter from Miss Fourrier asking what possibilities are offered in Klamath Falls in either a swimming pool or open water.

An attempt will be made by Miss Fourrier to remain in the water for a period of 72 or 80 hours and in attempting to establish this record, she prefers to attempt it in Klamath water.

Federals Hold Hill in Mazatlan

NOGALLES, Sonora, Mex., March 25. (U.P.)—Dispatches to revolutionary headquarters here today from Gen. Francisco Manzo, commanding the Insurreccionista attack on Mazatlan, Sonora, claimed that with the exception of one hill, rebels controlled the city.

"The federals are making their last stand in the old fortifications on the hill," Manzo advised. "I will wire details as soon as the job is completed."

Previous rebel bulletins said that Gen. Jaime Carrillo, federal defender of Mazatlan, and his staff had fled in an about the government gunboat Progresso.

Rebels have claimed that many federals fled from Mazatlan to Rosario, 50 miles to the south of the seaport.

MEXICO CITY, March 25. (U.P.)—The presidential palace announced today that rebels at Tamasachila, near the Sonora-Chihuahua border, have captured 220 federal Indian General Armenta, by a ruse. The rebels pretended to be government troops, invited Armenta to join them, and made prisoners of him and his men.

General Armenta was leading his men from Sonora into Chihuahua when they were captured. The prisoners were ordered taken to Chihuahua City.

Gen. Jaime Carrillo, federal general holding Mazatlan against the rebel assaults, reported today that three of his men were killed during the siege of the city. Seven federals were wounded, he said, while rebel casualties were 58 dead and three wounded.

Sixteen civilians also were wounded at Mazatlan, Carrillo reported.

The federal general said firing was resumed at Mazatlan this morning, which prevented re-

Spanish Fliers Cross Atlantic

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into the southwest tonight, some-where off the coast of Africa.

Only a few indefinite reports of the whereabouts of Capt. Ignacio Jimenez and Capt. Francisco Iglesias were received here today. The latest, and apparently the most authentic, said they passed over Cape Blanco, Africa, at 4:30 p. m. (10:20 a. m. C. S. T.).

That report was given out in Rio de Janeiro by the National Telegraph company. The plane at that time was heading towards the Cape Verde Islands, the nearest of which is more than 500 miles off Africa, to the southwest.

Jimenez and Iglesias left Seville at 5:24 p. m. Sunday quietly and without announcing their destination. It was presumed, however, they were going to Brazil, possibly to land at Rio de Janeiro. Their mechanic had preceded them to the Brazilian capital a month earlier, ostensibly to prepare for their landing.

Rio de Janeiro is about 4,000 miles from Seville, and the plane carried fuel for 5,000 miles in its tanks with about 70 additional gallons stored in bottles.
