Dr. Paul Carstens signed up for a membership in the Triple A association for this year at the Klamath Falls branch office at the chamber of commerce yesterday.

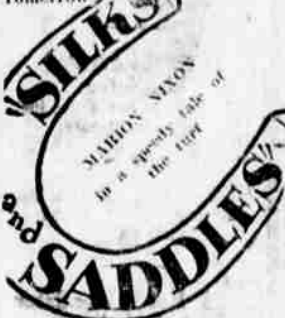
Nina L. Renner has arrived in the city by motor from San Francisco and expects to spend about three months in the city.

Discovery of the theft was made yesterday when the company offices were opened for business. A report was made to Chief of Police Keith Ambrose.

A small amount of money was taken. Papers and other valuables in the safe were not disturbed. It was learned the safe door had been left unlocked.

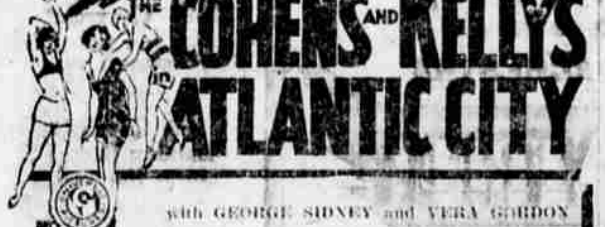
